Mme. Butterfly Will Be Given At Auditorium

California Grand Opera Co. in Matinee Presentation Saturday

California Grand Opera Company has added a surprise course to its operatic feast in the new Olympic Auditorium Oct. 6 to 12, in the form of Puccini's "Madame Butterfly," to be given Saturday afternoon, Oct. 10, with Rosina Torri in the leading role.

By adding this opera to the repertoire of six, the opera company accedes to demands of hundreds of out-of-town music lovers for a matinee performance, and brings the gifted and beautiful young Italian soprano before the public in two operas.

Torri, who made a sensational American debut with the California Grand Opera Company in San Francisco last week, will also sing "Manon," which opens the Los Angeles season Oct. 6. Tickets for all these operas are on sale at the George J. Birkel music store, Los Angeles, 448 South Broadway.

Praise Young Artist
Critics in the northern city have been lavish in their praise of the 24-year-old artist from La Scala. She has been described as a singer endowed with beauty, piquancy, a histrionic ability that carries conviction, and a voice of notable sweetness—a pure soprano of clear, dulcet quality and rare flexibility. Antonio Cortis will sing with Torri in "Butterfly."

Other operas to be sung here are "La Tosca," Oct. 7, with Claudia Muzio, Elinor Mario, and Antonio Cortis; "Samson and Delilah," Oct. 8, with Marguerita D'Alvarez, Ferdinand Anseau, Marcel Journet, and Antonio Nicolich; "The Barber of Seville," Oct. 9, with Elvira de Hidalgo, Mario, Schipa, Stracclari, and Journet; "Aida," Oct. 10, with Muzio, Anseau, Stracclari, and Love of Three Kings; Oct. 12, with Muzio, Anseau, Stracclari, and Journet.

Kosloff's Ballets will appear in "Samson and Delilah," "Aida," and "The Love of Three Kings." In the latter both Kosloff and his partner, Vera Fredova, will take part, at the head of an augmented ballet which will have its first performance on any stage.


