Ten-Pay Budget Plan Is Adopted By Rappaport's

Torrance Store Offers New System on Suit, Coat, Dress Sale

Inaugurated to "broaden service to men and women" of Torrance and vicinity, a ten-pay budget plan for the purchase of men's suits and coats and women's coats and dresses is announced today by Rappaport's department store.

"The plan," said Sam Rappaport, "is a new charge service which permits responsible persons to purchase fine clothing and pay out of income a moderate amount at the time of purchase and the balance in ten weekly installments.

"In formulating this new service to the people of Torrance," Mr. Rappaport continued, "we will charge no interest on deferred payments. Prices for cash, charge and ten-pay budget purchases will be identical. The adoption of the new plan will in now way alter our manner of handling the business of our regular cash and charge account customers. The new plan is merely an addition to our service."

Mr. Rappaport explained that accounts under the ten-pay budget plan will be arranged to suit pay-day requirements.

Mr. Rappaport asserted that the plan which he has adopted has met with tremendous approval on the part of the public in other cities where it has been adopted by numerous first-class department stores. He looks for a ready response to the innovation in Torrance.

ORDINANCE No. 125
 An Ordinance Calling a Special Election To Be Held in Certain Territory To Be Known as West Torrance on the 8th Day of December, 1925, and Providing for the Submitting to the Qualified Electors of Said District the Proposition of Annexing Said Territory to the City of Torrance, Designating the Polling Place and Appointing Election Officers for Said Election.

WHEREAS there was filed with the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance at a regular meeting thereof held on the 19th day of October, 1925, a petition signed by seventeen persons who declared themselves to be qualified electors of the district hereinafter described, and which petition requested that a special election be held within said territory submitting to the electors therein the question whether such territory shall be annexed to, incorporated in and made a part of said City of Torrance, and WHEREAS it appears that said petition is in form as required by an act of the legislature of the State of California entitled, "An

Act to provide for the alteration of the boundaries of and for the annexation of territory to municipal corporations, for the incorporation of such annexed territory in and as a part thereof, and for the districting, government and municipal control of such annexed territory," approved June 11, 1913. Now therefore,

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. The petition hereinbefore mentioned is hereby declared to be a valid and sufficient petition to require this Board of Trustees to call the election therein requested.

SECTION 2. An election shall be held on the 8th day of December, 1925, in West Torrance, which district or territory is more particularly described as follows:

All the territory within the following described boundary lines: Beginning at the northwesterly corner of the City of Torrance as of date September 1, 1925, and running thence westerly parallel with the northerly line of Huntington Street as shown on map of Tract No. 3458, as shown in Map Book 37, page 95 of Maps, records of Los Angeles County and Tract 2395, as shown in Map Book 33, page 94, records of Los Angeles County, and the westerly extension of the northerly line of Huntington Street to the easterly boundary line of the City of Redondo Beach as said boundary existed September 1, 1925; thence southerly along the easterly boundary line of the said City of Redondo Beach as said boundary existed September 1, 1925, and the southerly extension thereof to the point of intersection thereof with the westerly extension of the southerly line of Lots 1 to 13 inclusive of Tract No. 454 as recorded in Map Book 15, page 13, records of Los Angeles County; thence easterly along the said last described line and the easterly extension thereof to the easterly line of Ocean Avenue of said Tract No. 454; thence southerly in a straight line to the southwesterly corner of Lot 9

of said Tract 454; thence easterly along the southerly line of said Lot 9 and the easterly extension thereof to the easterly line of Meadow Park Tract as recorded in Book 15, page 60 Miscellaneous Records of Los Angeles County; thence southerly in a straight line to the southwesterly corner of Lot 117 of Tract No. 2200 as recorded in Map Book 26, Page 20 records of Los Angeles County; thence easterly along the southerly line of said Lot 117 and the easterly extension thereof to the southeasterly corner of Lot 102 of said Tract 2200, the same being the southwesterly corner of the boundary of the City of Torrance as said boundary existed September 1, 1925; thence northerly, westerly and northerly following the various courses of the westerly boundary of the City of Torrance as said boundary existed September 1, 1925, to the point of beginning.

SECTION 3. Ballots shall be prepared for said election containing thereon, the following words: "Shall West Torrance be annexed to the City of Torrance?" "Yes"; with a voting square to the right of and opposite such proposition.

SECTION 4. For the purpose of holding such special election said district shall constitute one precinct and a polling place is hereby established at the garage located at 1859 Redondo-Torrance boulevard, said garage being commonly known as Rogers Service Station. The election officers for said election shall be as follows: Judges, Lawrence Edwin and Margaret Felker. Inspector, Laura D. Kirk. The polling place for such election shall be open for voting continually during the hours from 8 o'clock A. M. to 7 o'clock P. M. of the date of said election, except that any person at the said polling place at closing time may cast his vote as soon as any booths are available for his use.

SECTION 5. In all particulars not recited in this ordinance the ballots at such election and the opening and closing of the polls and the holding and conducting of such election shall be in conformity as near as may be, with the laws of this state concerning general elections except as otherwise provided in the Act of the Legislature of June 11, 1913, heretofore referred to.

The City Clerk shall cause notice to be given of such election by the publication of a notice thereof in the Culver City Star, a newspaper of general circulation printed and published outside of the City of Torrance, but in the County of Los Angeles, at least once a week for a period of four successive weeks next preceding the date of election.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper of general circulation published and circulated in the said City of Torrance, and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.
