## Ask for Bids on Sewer Work in This Territory

Directors of Sanitary District Will Award Contract Next Month

**SACRAMENTO**—Receipt of the two first applications for 1926 license plates from San Francisco, with which the owners erroneously sent their pink certificates of ownership, today caused Will H. Marsh, chief of the division of motor vehicles to call attention of California motorists to the fact that licenses will be renewed during the coming year on the white certificate of registration only.  
The division does not want the certificate of ownership because a recent amendment to the law does not require its annual renewal, Marsh said, adding that as this is in effect the owner's title to his car, it is a valuable document and should be kept in a safe place.  
Here are the rules laid down by Marsh for securing new licenses:  
1. First see that you have the white certificate, and if you have lost it, you must immediately for an application blank and secure a new one. Blanks can be obtained at any division office or branch automobile club office.  
2. Be sure that your white certificate shows the correct certificate and that your name and number are legible.  
3. Enclose your white certificate with your fee of \$3 in an envelope and mail them to Sacramento. Do not send currency. Use certified checks, postal money orders, or bank drafts.  
4. If you own a truck or other commercial vehicle send the same fee as last year.  
Marsh added that the division is now ready to receive applications and will work on them as fast as received. No plates will be sent out until after Christmas, but those who apply earliest will be served first.


