





Trustees Adopt New Proceeding On Improvement

Oil Macadam Streets Are Specified in West Side Paving Specifications

All previous proceedings were abandoned and the Board of Trustees last night adopted a new resolution of intention to improve the district between Madrid and Cedar avenues. The new specifications adopted by the board provide for sidewalks, curbs and sewers throughout the entire area; for cement pavement on Cedar avenue between Carson street and Dominguez street; resurfacing of Carson street between Madrid and Cedar avenues with asphalt; and oil macadam paving on all other streets in the district.

The change in the specifications was made after it was ascertained that a hard-surface type of pavement throughout the area would make the cost almost confidant, particularly for corner lots. The original intention of the proceedings was to provide reasonably priced residence lots for workmen in new industries considering Torrance as a location.

The trustees met Monday night, Dec. 28, at the date for protesting the proposed improvements.

about 4 mills on average monthly bill for electric service and is so small it cannot possibly add to rates.

"Advertising keeps down and reduces rates by creating market value which in turn permits the economies of mass production and lower distribution expense."

THE most significant fact for people to think about is that while national taxes and debts were reduced several hundred million dollars this year, state expenses, debts and taxes the same year increased by hundreds of millions.

In many states, as in many cities, a petty Tammany machine of second-class politicians is running things on the old spoils system which is being fought by progressives who are injecting business policies.

There can be no question but that the stronghold of tax-boasting, special-privilege and spoils politics is in state administrations that have not adopted business methods.

IF auto insurance to protect the public is so good a thing that one believes the state should undertake the insurance, why not go on and have the state build and repair the car also, sell spare parts, and do the painting? An insurance policy on every car to protect the public may be a fair requirement. But that does not establish a presumption that because the state requires such a policy it should also furnish the insurance or repair automobiles.

The state is formed for doing the social, collective things that the individual cannot do. It is not properly a seller of commodities or services. It should not go into business and rob one or many of their chance to develop industries. However desirable insurance may be, selling insurance is no more a proper function of government than the printing of newspapers, the shoeing of horses, or the selling of automobile tires.

No man with a job, or a home, or a farm, or a business of his own wants the government to step into the industrial field.







Redondo Blvd. Paving Opened For Motorists

Engineer Says Dip at Bend Necessary for Drainage Purposes

Motorists are enjoying the new pavement on Redondo boulevard. It was opened for traffic late Saturday afternoon. City Engineer Jessup told the Board of Trustees last night that the dip at the curve in the highway was necessary for drainage purposes, but that he had ordered it filled up somewhat in order to eliminate the jolt.

A 15-miles-an-hour zone will be established at the corner of the boulevard and Madrona avenue. The Automobile Club of Southern California is studying the highway and will soon erect necessary signs. Lights along the boulevard will burn all night. The trustees authorized the city attorney and clerk to enter into a contract for the lights with the Southern California Edison Company. The cost will be \$2 per light per month.

Adopt Parking Restriction For Hospital Street

Trustees Take Action to Insure Rest for Patients at Night

The Board of Trustees last night voted to prohibit the parking of automobiles on both sides of Engracia avenue in front of the Jared Sidney Torrance Memorial Hospital after 6:30 p. m. This action was taken when it was learned that the starting of motors at the conclusion of parties in the new Women's Clubhouse has greatly disturbed patients in the hospital.

The board was certain that the people of Torrance would be willing to park a few hundred feet away in order to insure the patients against the unavoidable noise of starting motors.

The Board of Trustees last night authorized the city clerk to contract for the purchase of a Chevrolet touring car for the use of the city inspection department. The car will be purchased from the Day and Night Garage at a cost of \$738.
