New Proceeding For Annexation Now Under Way

If such a consolidation is approved by the voters of the district affected, the breach between Redondo Beach and Torrance would be closed twice, once by consolidation with Torrance of the Del Amo ranch, which extends to the Redondo Beach boundary, and once again by the consolidation of the area north of Huntington street.

Proponents of the consolidation assert that the proposition will carry by an overwhelming majority. They state that a majority will sign the petition requesting that the election be held. As soon as the petition asking for an election is filed the Board of Trustees of Torrance will meet and take the necessary action.

The official acceptance by the Torrance trustees last Saturday of the notice of intention to file petitions gives this proceeding legal precedence over any other annexation proceedings which include the same territory until after the Torrance consolidation election has been held.
