JUSTICE COURT

J. M. Lausin of Home Gardens pleaded guilty to a violation of the Wright act and is in default of the \$350 or 350 days imposed by Judge Hunter. Guy Ward of Huntington Park and T. Shiroishi of Compton both pleaded guilty to violations of the Wright act and were unable to raise the fines of \$50 and \$100 imposed respectively. They're in jail, too.

A jury last Monday found Valentino Moro and Arcadia Larrarago, of Vernon, guilty of the possession of intoxicating liquors, as charged, and they were each fined \$500 or 500 days. A commitment was issued. The men were acquitted of the charge of possessing apparatus for the manufacture of liquor.

Mrs. Alice Logan of South Main street pleaded not guilty to violations of the Wright act, and will have a court trial Feb. 19. Bail was fixed at \$500 cash or \$1500 property bond.

James B. Savage of Beverly Hills pleaded not guilty of possession and transportation of liquor, and will have a jury trial March 23.

C. A. Roberts of El Segundo Gardens will have a preliminary hearing Feb. 9. He is charged with a high grade misdemeanor.

Rudolph Marcin and C. M. Stevenson, of Beverly Hills, are each charged with a high grade misdemeanor and will have their preliminary hearings Feb. 9. And each will appear Friday to answer to a charge of violating the Wright act.

Justice Sentences Band of Gypsies; Paroles Granted

Twenty-nine gypsies, 22 men and seven women, took turns in explaining to Judge Hunter last Friday all about their celebration staged near Julian City Thursday night. As one of the women, with expressive gestures, put it: "We smoke a little, and drink a little—you know." They all pleaded guilty to disturbing the peace and, with the exception of three who paid their fines of \$100 each, were released in the big sightseeing bus and taken back to the county jail.

Later the parole board at Los Angeles and Judge Hunter paroled all but four who had paid their fines. The paroles were granted on condition that the gypsies stay out of Los Angeles County for two years. The tribe left for other regions.



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
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
