## WIFE SAVERS

**Fish Turbet.**—You may buy fresh fish for the turbot, or you may use leftovers of cooked fish. Free from bones and skin and break in small pieces, or flake. Make white sauce of two tablespoons butter, melted, add one tablespoon flour, mix smooth, add one cup or more of milk and season with salt, pepper and chopped parsley. Pour over fish, cover with bread crumbs, and bake until crumbs are brown. Hard-boiled eggs may be chopped quite fine and added to the fish.

**Cocoanut-Ginger Gems.**—One-half cup butter, one level teaspoon ginger, one-half cup molasses, one level teaspoon soda, one-eighth teaspoon salt, one-half cup chopped seeded raisins, one cup sugar, two cups flour, one teaspoon cinnamon, one-half cup milk, two eggs. Cream butter and sugar, add molasses and beaten egg yolks; then add milk, in which soda has been dissolved. Combine salt, flour and ginger and gradually stir into first mixture, then add raisins and stiffly beaten egg whites. Fill well greased gem pans half full. Remove some of the centers when baked and fill with preserves or jelly and chopped nuts. Frost with a thick cocoanut frosting.

**FOR FAMILY OF TWO**  
Here are a few approximate amounts for two which the bride may find useful:

- Lima beans, one-half cup (dried).
- Boston baked beans, two cups (dried).
- Dried fruit, one-quarter pound.
- Baking powder biscuit, one cup flour (six to eight biscuits).
- Popovers, one cup flour.
- Griddle cakes, one cup flour, one cup milk.
- Muffins, one cup flour (six muffins).
- Pie crust, one and one-quarter cups flour (one two-crust pie).
- Custard, one cup milk.
- Souffle, two or three egg whites.

Whipped cream, two cups milk or cream.  
Whipped cream, one-half to three-fourths cup of cream whipped.

Rice pudding, one-half cup rice, two cups milk.  
Cream soup, one and one-half cups thin white sauce.

Creamed vegetables on toast, one-half cup vegetables and one cup white sauce.  
Cocoa, tea or coffee, two cups liquid.

Omelet, two or three eggs.  
Macaroni, one cup (raw).  
Escalloped fish or vegetable, as side dish, one cup; as main dish, two cups.

Willow furniture can be cleaned by giving it a thorough bath in a strong brine. Salt and vinegar will clean brass.

Where possible, canned vegetables should be placed in a colander and the water from the faucet run through them to remove all taste of the tin.

**Chop Suey.**—One pound roast, one cup celery, one cup Bermuda onion, one tablespoon sugar, three tablespoons oriental sauce. Put one teaspoon drippings in iron spider. Add celery and onion and cook for a short time, being careful not to burn. Add meat cut in small pieces, and gravy or water. Season with sugar, salt to taste, and oriental sauce. Thicken with a little flour and water.

**Oatmeal Cookies.**—One cup bran flakes, one cup oatmeal, two cups whole wheat, one cup brown sugar, one cup shortening, one cup raisins, two eggs, one teaspoon soda, four tablespoons sweet milk, one teaspoon cinnamon, one teaspoon vanilla, one-half teaspoon salt. Cream sugar and shortening, add eggs beaten, and other ingredients in order.

#### THE MEDICINE CHEST

In practically every home there is a medicine cupboard in the bathroom or in "mother's room."

Every woman owes it to herself to have a well stocked medicine cupboard. This does not mean an unnecessary outlay of money. It merely means preparedness. Keep a shelf for old muslins and flannels, should the need of fomentations or dressings arise. Some bandages. Small package of baking soda and boric acid, a glass eye cup, a measuring glass, a thermometer, a medicine dropper, the old-fashioned remedies for indigestion, such as essence of peppermint.

It is no longer necessary to take pains making mustard plasters, when one can buy the mustard leaves, ready to moisten and apply. But if you live far away from modern drug stores, keep in your medicine cupboard a spoon and a bowl, some flour and mustard mixed in proportions of one of mustard to five of flour. An old-fashioned mustard plaster is as popular as ever when a counter-irritant is desired to relieve pain or nausea.

#### SUGGESTIONS

Babies use so many night dresses and buttons are so easily wrung off on wash day that the idea of sewing tapes on for fastening instead of buttons is a good one. Run one in the neck binding and catch the others in when stitching on the facings for the opening. When the placket is finished one set will be on the edge and the other back the width of the facing, making a snug closing. The garment is much more quickly completed, also, than when button-holes must be made and buttons sewed on.

Sew loops of wide-tape to the top of baby's silk and wool stockings. Then run a safety pin through the loop when pinning the stockings to the diapers. It will save a great many holes and runs and add months to the wear of the stockings.

If you will always hang the selvage of your baby's diapers down in the windy weather you will not have ragged or torn hems.

#### HAVE CHRISTMAS PARTY LATE, BUT NOT 'NEVER'


Mr. and Mrs. George Proctor entertained Sunday at a belated Christmas party in honor of the children of Mr. Proctor's brother, Ervin Proctor.


