## Head of Kiwanis Intern'l Tells of Club's Purposes

In an age when associations of all kinds are a feature of the times, organized effort must be outstanding in order to attract attention. Among the organizations which are making an indelible impression upon the lives and characters of our people are the great service clubs, among which is Kiwanis International, which is attracting signal attention during the current week by reason of its observance of the eleventh anniversary of its birth.

Organized as a single club in the city of Detroit on Jan. 21, 1915, with no thought of extension efforts, it has developed into an organization of more than 1450 clubs with a membership of more than 95,000. Confined by policy to the American continent, these clubs are scattered through all the states of the union and the provinces of Canada. This remarkable growth within the brief period of eleven years finds its explanation in the fact that the organization is founded on fairness to all and based on principles most practical.

Just as its rapid development has been due to the appeal its purposes make to public opinion, so its stability is due to the unselfish type of its activities. Its strength is found in the principles it advocates and the objectives it fosters. Altruistic and ethical in character, its undertakings appeal to the highest type of civic and social thought.

Among its outstanding activities may be mentioned its work in behalf of under-privileged children, including the mentally, morally, financially and physically under-privileged; its fostering of education toward a better understanding of citizenship duties and the more universal use of the franchise; its guidance and placement of those engaged in vocational training; its development of a co-operative attitude between those residing in urban and rural districts; its appeal for honesty in business and professional life and fidelity to duty in public office; its co-operation with the efforts toward preventing, and protecting lives and property against, fire losses.
