Budget of City Comes Out Even First 6 Months

Fitzhugh Makes Financial Report to the Board of Trustees Monday
James M. Fitzhugh, chairman of the finance committee of the Board of Trustees, reported Monday night that at the end of the first six months of the present fiscal year the city of Torrance had expended 49 percent of its annual income as provided for in the city budget. The budget aggregate was \$96,319. At the end of the first six months \$47,658 had been expended, leaving a balance of 51 percent, or \$48,661. Applause from the audience greeted the report.

A number of candidates will be initiated that evening, and all members are urged to attend. Visiting Rebekahs are always welcome.


JUSTICE COURT
