Closed Car Sales Bring About Ford Price Reductions

Probably the biggest recent piece of automobile news is the Ford Motor Company announcement of a reduction in price of the entire line of Ford closed cars.

The new price level is ascribed to the trend of closed car buying which has been rapidly developing. According to a statement by the company accompanying the announcement, this trend has reached such a high point that manufacturing economies have been effected and, in accordance with the established policy of the company, the benefits of these economies are passed on to purchasers of Ford cars.

Coming virtually on the heels of the sweeping improvements and refinements made in Ford cars last fall, the new prices mark the climax of a period of general ascending values. Less than six months ago Ford bodies were completely redesigned to make possible a greater degree of beauty, driving ease and riding comfort. In line with this development, all-steel bodies were introduced, together with closed cars in color and numerous refinements in the chassis.

These improvements, which were the most pronounced ever made in Ford cars, are now supplemented by the lowest prices at which Ford closed cars have been sold. The reductions range from \$95 off the cost of the Fordor to \$20 off the price of the coupe. The Tudor, most popular family car of the Ford line, is reduced \$60.

WIFE SAVERS BY MRS. MARY MORTON

Hamburg, Southern Style.—Have your butcher grind one pound of round steak season it as for plain hamburger (including onion if you like), add to this one cup of washed uncooked rice, make this into patties. Put it in the skillet and add one small can of tomatoes and one cup of cold water, one-half teaspoon paprika, one-half quarter teaspoon sugar, one-half teaspoon salt. Let it come to boil, then place it on back of the stove and let it simmer. Turn over when half done (this takes one hour), but keep watching it, as it burns very easily.

Cornmeal Muffins.—Take one cup cornmeal, one-half cup flour, one teaspoon salt, one tablespoon baking powder, one cup milk, two tablespoons syrup, two tablespoons melted butter, and one egg.

Fruit Salad.—Combine any canned fruit, cut in pieces, with cherries, oranges and bananas, and top with whipped cream, or use various juices.

In dusting, washing windows, using polish on furniture and floors, use a pair of large tweezers with a good point, protect the point with a cloth so there will be no scratches, and any corner can be absolutely free from any dust or dirt. Tweezers can be had at a small cost, and the work of cleaning be made lighter.

If cream is not procurable this makes a fairly good substitute: Heat two cups of milk and add into it the rind of one lemon. Beat the yolks of two eggs with one teaspoon of flour and one or two tablespoons of cream, and when the milk is near boiling pour gently over the whisk over the saucer, whisk over the fire until thick as cream, then take it off and as it cools add half a teaspoon of vanilla. Another cream substitute is to pour slowly a little hot water onto a well beaten fresh egg and flavor as desired.

Handle silk hosiery gently. More silk stockings are ruined by careless handling than are ever worn out in actual service. The right way to put on a silk stocking is to roll it down to the foot, something gently over the toes and heel, and finally unrolling the length of the stocking evenly. The wrong way is to pull or "drag" a stocking on. Threads are sure to be broken sooner or later and disastrous "ladders" started.

Roughness on the top of the kitchen stove may be removed by using sandpaper. Do this before putting on blacking.

Baked Chicken.—Take about a three-pound chicken, cut into pieces, place in an iron frying pan. Arrange several slices of bacon and one sliced onion on top, salt and pepper, and add about one cup of water. Cover and bake in a hot oven for about an hour, basting occasionally as needed. The bacon gives it an unusually good flavor. Make the gravy by thickening the juice left in the bottom after the chicken has been removed from the pan.

Salmon Salad.—Take one can of salmon, add one-half cup of cold peas, one-half cup chopped celery, and a few nut meats. Mix with enough salad dressing to moisten. Serve on a leaf of head lettuce on individual salad plates.

When cooking such vegetables as carrots, spinach, turnips and cauliflower, cook

other fat to canned salmon in baking salmon loaf. It is oily enough in itself.

Canned peas mixed with creamed canned shrimp make an easy and tempting dish.

When you plan to rather a dish of wild strawberries or raspberries for dessert, pick them with their stems as flowers are picked. Wash them and place in a dish or bowl, stems and all. Sprinkle them well with powdered sugar and let them be eaten from the stem.

Celery stuffed with peanut butter and laid on lettuce leaves makes a delicious salad.

Linoleum and kindred floor coverings should not be scrubbed with a ball of soap, but mopped up with a damp cloth, which will clean them thoroughly and yet will not destroy the finish.

Roquefort Dressing.—Rub the salad bowl with garlic, adding a teaspoon sugar, half a teaspoon each of salt and paprika, a dash of black pepper, and a sprinkle of tabasco sauce or cayenne pepper. Crush a large slice of Roquefort cheese into these flavorings with a fork and blend thoroughly, add two tablespoons of lemon juice or one of concentrated vinegar, then slowly add a cup and a half of mayonnaise. Serve on lettuce hearts.
