#### Angelus Dairy Completes Plant For Pasteurizing

All Milk Supplied by Cows on William Schuck Farm

One of the most modern and sanitary dairies in Southern California has just been completed at the new city limits of Torrance, corner of 19th street and Normandie avenue. It is owned by William P. Schuck, and is known as the Angelus Dairy.

All the milk and cream furnished by the Angelus Dairy is produced right on the Angelus farm. Mr. Schuck has a herd of 60 dairy cows, mostly Jerseys, and they are under his constant care at all times.

They are washed before each milking, and are housed in a sanitary barn which has a cement floor and is cleaned every day.

All the milk is pasteurized in a modern plant which has just been completed on the Angelus farm. While not as large as the "big city" dairies, it has every modern feature that the largest plants possess.

The new plant has the latest type pasteurizing machine, an effective sterilizer, bottle washer, and a complete refrigeration plant to serve the cooling room and make ice for packing the milk while it is being delivered.

Mr. and Mrs. Schuck are well known locally, and their many friends predict a big success for their new dairy.

The Angelus dairy makes deliveries in both Torrance and Lomita. It can be reached by telephoning Gardena 23, or Thornwall 4292 on the Los Angeles exchange.

### U. S. Seeking Men As Inspectors of Border Immigrants

WASHINGTON.—The United States Civil Service Commission announced today that until April 17 it will receive applications for positions of immigrant inspectors for duty in California and neighboring states. Knowledge of Spanish is required.

The examination will be held soon after April 17 at convenient places in Arizona, Arkansas, California, Nevada, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas.

The duties include the examination of alien arrivals, the investigation of aliens unlawfully in the United States, and the prevention of aliens from entering the country in violation of law.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or from the secretary of the United States Civil Service Board at San Francisco, Denver, New Orleans, or St. Louis.
