

Bathroom On Wheels Coming To Torrance

Every local owner will be interested in seeing the remarkable traveling exhibit of plumbing fixtures and materials which is to visit Torrance on Monday morning, March 15. Housed in a big special body built on a motor truck of 223-inch wheelbase is a varied and interesting display of the latest designs in bathroom, kitchen and laundry equipment.

Thousands of people have examined this free exhibit along its route from city to city, and have carried away practical ideas and suggestions for the improvement of their homes.

Within the truck is installed a built-in bathtub complete with overhead shower and colored curtains. A combination kitchen sink and laundry tray, a fixture which saves space, time and steps, is also displayed.

Other fixtures included are three different types of lavatories, a wide variety of valves and faucets, and other plumbing and heating accessories.

Additional interest is given this exhibit through the fact that the supply fixtures of the lavatories and sink displayed are actually connected to running water. The water is supplied by an automatic water system installed on the truck.

There is no admission charge, and none of the fixtures displayed are for sale.

The exhibit truck will be parked at the First National Bank corner in Torrance Monday morning, March 15.

Fine New School Will Open Soon At Palos Verdes

Malaga Cove Is Served by Structure Erected on 7-Acre Grounds

One of the finest elementary schools in the state has been completed at Palos Verdes Estates and will be in use before the end of March, according to an announcement yesterday by Mrs. Romayne C. Martin, secretary of the Palos Verdes school board. Formal dedication will take place some time in April at a joint celebration sponsored by the Palos Verdes Home Association, School Board, and Women's Club.

The new structure, called the Malaga Cove School, was designed by Allison and Allison, and cost \$85,000. It is of reinforced concrete construction with stucco finish. There is an auditorium seating 300 people, with stage and dressing rooms for school exercises and amateur theatricals.

The school has four classrooms, besides an office, kitchen, and teachers' room. The equipment is thoroughly modern in every respect. All furniture is of the movable type. Each child in the primary department will have its own table, gaily painted in an attractive color.

The school grounds cover seven and one-half acres. Beautification of these grounds is now under way, and equipment for outdoor play is being installed. There will be three tennis courts, two handball courts, two basketball courts, and a baseball field, besides complete gymnastic equipment for healthful exercise.

Miss Edith Perry is principal of the school. Other teachers are the Misses Mildred Hilliard and Edna Sprung. The school is very successful and popular already, as is proved by the fact that it is already drawing children from several neighboring communities. Members of the school board expressed themselves yesterday as being determined to maintain forever the high standard and wholesome atmosphere that has been established, so that new residents at Palos Verdes may feel that the school is a real attraction of the community.
