Public notice is hereby given that the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, did, at a regular meeting of said Board, held on the 8th day of March, 1926, pass a resolution of intention, No. 281, to order the following work to be done and improvement to be made, within said City, to-wit:

1. The abandoning, vacating and closing up of a portion of the alley in Block 15, Torrance Tract, as per map thereof recorded in Map Book 22, pages 94 and 95, Records of Los Angeles County, and particularly described as follows:

That portion of the alley in Block 15, Torrance Tract, lying northwesterly of Lot 1, in said Block, being from the northwesterly prolongation of the southwesterly line of Lot 1, Block 15, to the intersection of said alley in said Block 15, with Cravens Avenue.

2. The exterior boundary of the district of lands to be affected and benefited by said work or improvement and to be assessed to pay the cost, are hereby specified and declared to be as follows: All of
