1. The abandoning, vacating and closing up of a portion of the alley in Block 15, Torrance Tract, as per map thereof recorded in Map Book 22, pages 94 and 95, Records of Los Angeles County, and particularly described as follows:

That portion of the alley in Block 15, Torrance Tract, lying northwesterly of Lot 1, in said Block, being from the northwesterly prolongation of the southwesterly line of Lot 1, Block 15, to the intersection of said alley in said Block 15, with Cravens Avenue.

2. The exterior boundary of the district of lands to be affected and benefited by said work or improvement and to be assessed to pay the of, are hereby specified and declared to be as follows: All of Lots 1, 20, 21 and 22 in Block 15, Torrance Tract.

3. The proceedings for the above mentioned improvement shall be taken under an act approved March 6th, 1889, being entitled "An Act to provide for laying out, opening, extending, widening, straightening, or closing up in whole or in part any street, square, lane, alley, court or place within municipal limits, and to condemn and acquire any and all lands and property






