



(Continued on Page 2) Torrance. They should all live in Torrance and none should be engaged who do not. This is true of salaried men and laborers. The people who live here keep the city going, and when anybody goes on the city payroll the first question asked should be "Do you live in Torrance?" Citizens of the United States should also be given preference. For this is fundamentally an Anglo-Saxon town.

Not Too Much Money It is easy to spend money when you have too much. This principle applies to the city of Torrance. I think a city is more efficiently run when officials have to think twice before they spend a dollar than it is when they have plenty of money in the bank.

Torrance is "sitting pretty" as regards its ability to enjoy a low tax rate. Streets are paved. No general benefit public improvements are immediately needed. Our bonded indebtedness is only about \$45,000. As a property owner and townsmen I desire to see Torrance ahead in all worth-while lines and believe that the city government is the most important factor in solid progress. I like Torrance. I believe in Torrance. And if I can contribute in any way to this city's progress and prosperity I will consider it a rare privilege to do so.

Political Turmoil There has been too much political bickering in the city. Some of it has doubtless been justified. But much of it has been based on personal prejudice and hatred. The People's League was formed with one of its main purposes being to put an end to that portion of personal dislikes. I am happy to be able to state that neither my fellow-nominees, Mr. Inman nor myself are obligated to any individual or group that has taken part in any campaign of bitter personal hatred in Torrance and so feel that we can act as city trustees with a unity of action and harmony of spirit that is essential to the peace and prosperity of any community.

Strong differences of opinion always will exist in any city. They should always be voiced. But when they become personal and bitter it is time to call another turn. I think that it is those who votes with his four fellow trustees when he does not agree with them is not doing his duty. If a trustee differs he should have the courage of his convictions and frankly say so.

Three Are Agreed Mr. Inman and Mr. Dennis and I have discussed the platform at length. We are all agreed on the principles of low taxes, economy, fair play, intelligent zoning, work for Torrance men, lights when voted by the people, and engaging only city employees who live in Torrance. We are agreed on a policy affecting the engineering and police departments and can work in complete harmony with respect to all these matters. There will arise matters on which we might disagree, and when such matters do come up we have agreed that we will disagree without bitterness. In closing I want to urge upon all the people of Torrance the importance of voting. That is the great American privilege. Show me a city in which 90 percent of the people vote at every election and I'll show you a city that is run right. No matter how you are going to vote, be sure and vote. by the assessment district plan. It should be voted by the people.

The principle of opposition to special privilege is one to which all will adhere. It sounds pretty general, but it can be made specific. I believe that the city of Torrance owes no single individual any more consideration than another, that all legislation must be designed to benefit the greatest number of people.

Zoning Ordinance The zoning ordinance is vitally important to Torrance. The establishment of proper set-back lines, sensible building restrictions and the protection of one class of buildings in a district against the other types in the same district is important in any growing community. But there are too many zones in Torrance. The number should be reduced. Such reduction will encourage building on vacant lots in the city, increasing the population, enhancing the value of all property, and do away with much of the difficulty in enforcing the present zoning law fairly and without hardship to anyone.

Home Buying Business men of Torrance contribute generously to all charitable causes and community activities. It behooves the people to return the generosity. This can be done in one way by the purchasing of municipal supplies from Torrance firms. The factor of price enters the consideration, of course. I believe that a price being fair, the city has no right to buy goods out of town when every business house in Torrance is taxed specially for a business license in addition to the regular taxes.

In any contract for a public improvement I believe it should be made unmistakably clear that the contractor must employ Torrance labor whenever possible.

Live in Torrance All city employees must live in Torrance. The taxpayers of the city have the right to insist on this and the Board of Trustees should not keep any man on the city payroll who lives outside of Torrance.

I wish to express my thanks to the many friends who have evidenced confidence in me by asking me to run for city trustee and I realize that I can express my gratitude in no better way than to carry out the above principles to the letter if I am elected on April 13th. Mr. Wolfe and Mr. Dennis are pledged to carry out the same principles as are set forth in the People's League platform. It would be a pleasure to co-operate with these men in carrying out such a program of city government.

Tummy? Well think this over: The Chamber of Commerce made possible the annexation to the city of Torrance of four and one-half square miles of territory with an assessed valuation of almost \$2,000,000. On the basis of the present tax rate that means almost \$20,000 added to the Torrance city income next year. There are so few streets to maintain in the annexed territory that little will have to be spent next year in the district. The increase in the assessed valuation will boost the city income by about one fifth. That alone will enable a reduction from 98 cents to about 78 cents. And it was the so-called "big" or municipal "clique" that did it for the city of Torrance. Other reductions made by the practice of strict economy should give Torrance one of the lowest tax rates in Southern California.

It is easy to be against things. Inherent in all of us is a tendency to oppose things as they are for things as we think they ought to be. But there is more than the "ferriant" gauge by which to judge a candidate. Apply this formula and see how it fits: "What has this or that particular candidate ever been FOR?"

Speaking of saving money for Torrance, we cannot help but recall the time Torrance voted down a proposition to buy the sewer farm. Had that proposition carried Torrance would have acquired a rich oil-bearing territory. But opponents, chiefly Bill Klusman, befuddled the issue and the proposition was defeated. He also opposed the paving of Western avenue. Was he ever FOR anything? Answer: Yes. He's always been for Bill Klusman.

The police department is in a political uproar. It's too bad. Almost every man on the force is negotiating to get himself a promotion. And the antics of the boys, while probably natural from the standpoint of self-preservation, are not conducive to the greatest police efficiency now or later. Some of the officers have been SEEKING promises of promotion in return for promised support. Personally we would vote against any man who allowed himself to be swayed by policemen who are devoting their attention to politics on city time. Torrance doesn't want that kind of politics. It is the cheap variety of the old ward-heffing, bar-room days.

Here really is the chief issue in this campaign—to end for all time the political personal fights that have existed for so long in Torrance. To do this the people would have to elect candidates who have not been aligned with any faction in previous city affairs.

The work above mentioned consists of the construction of a fire station on Lot 1, Block 15, Torrance Tract, as described in the working drawings and specifications therefor, now on file with the City Clerk of the City of Torrance.

Each bid or proposal must contain an offer on the part of the bidder to enter into a contract within ten (10) days after acceptance of bid. The successful bidder will be required to furnish a bond to the amount of fifty (50) percent of the contract price conditioned upon his paying all claims for labor and material entering into such work, and shall accompany the amount equal to twenty-five (25) percent of such contract price conditioned upon faithful performance of the said contract and the completing of said work according to specifications within ninety days from the date of such contract.
