Q. What points are required for a standard Chinchilla rabbit?  
A. (Continued from last week.) **DISQUALIFICATIONS** and points to look out for and avoid when buying Chinchilla rabbits: White patches on body, odd colored eyes, barred feet, dewlap, large ears, drooping or lopped ears, white patches on feet or head, putty nose, and white toenails. A rabbit with any disease is naturally disqualified. In buying Chinchilla rabbits, one should pay rigid attention to the above mentioned requirements and more rigid attention to the disqualifications. In so doing, a great deal of expense and trouble will be avoided and the result will be a money-making herd of Chinchilla rabbits.

the conservative and liberal elements of any city; that police departments are generally inefficient because they are ruled by politics; that the whimsical public is a poor master; that the organized underworld in the larger cities usually has more to say about police policy than any other group.

ANY police executive who wants to hold his job in almost any city must play the game of politics. He must curry favor in various ways. He must regulate his department with an eye to every coming election, else he will have no department to regulate after the votes are counted.

If he fails to accept his position as a political one and governs himself without regard for politics, he is doomed certainly and surely to leave office in short order.

CONSIDER too the difficulty of his position. His is the responsibility of enforcing the law. Every man arrested by his department has friends. These friends strain every influence at their command to "fix things" for the accused. If the police executive listens to their pleas he makes enemies of those who demand law enforcement without favoritism. If he refuses to be influenced he makes enemies of all who have asked the favor. In either case he piles up opposition to himself. This process continues. In a year or two he has made a host of enemies. When those enemies and if those they can influence constitute a majority of the voters at an election, or even a powerful minority, off goes your Mr. Police Executive's official head. And another is substituted, to last only as long as he can govern the mathematics by which his enemies multiply.

**Roegge Defends Nu-Air Plan in New Statement**

Nu-Air Promotor Says Company Not of "Endless" Chain Variety

Fred C. Roegge, head and founder of the Nu-Air Rubber Company of America, mailed the following statement to newspapers yesterday: "No one recognizes more fully than I the fact that an endless chain which is dependent upon constantly securing more and more new members or customers is certain to reach a point where many persons lose that which they have put in, for such a plan cannot go on forever. The basis of all such systems is the sale of a commodity or right, the purchaser of which reimburses himself and makes a profit by selling similar goods or rights to others whose sole qualification for taking up the work is their payment of money for something."

"The Nu-Air plan, on the contrary, builds up a selling organization exactly as does an insurance company, by appointing general agents, subagents, etc., each of whom is empowered to nominate subordinates from whose sales a profit is derived. The classifications in Nu-Air are limited to an extension which will result in a number of salesmen equal to a little less than one half of one percent of the motor vehicle registration of the state of California, at the start of the selling campaign, so that each salesman should have at least 200 potential customers for tires alone. Those in the lowest classification are salesmen of merchandise—tires; they do not derive their profit from extending the so-called "chain," but from selling goods, just as the insurance salesman sells insurance."

"There is no other understanding by which they are induced to join the organization aside from the probability of promotion if they are diligent and successful. That which they buy is not the thing which they sell—most important and therein is the one important point on which the Nu-Air plan has been misrepresented. "Every member of the organization equips himself with an advertising outfit, not to enable him to sell other advertising outfits, but to help him sell tires. He buys a set of tires for himself, not for resale."

"The volume of business in tires of course depends upon the success of the salesmen, and their number up to the maximum, but an extension of the organization beyond this fixed point would defeat its own object. For unless salesmen can make money they will not work, and they cannot sell tires from which they profit if the proportion of salesmen is too great in comparison with the number of possible customers."

"We are building a permanent selling force through which we can market not only tires but any other commodities which we may select, and our whole plan is based on making a profit for every man and woman who works for and with us."

**Urge Public to Utilize Library At Narbonne Hi**

It is hoped that the people of the Harbor City-Lomita community will make the fullest possible use of the library at the Nathaniel A. Narbonne High School.

The library is open Tuesday and Thursday evenings from 7 until 9, and the grown people of the community are urged to go to read in the library and to take books home with them if they wish to do so.

There are about three thousand volumes in the library, covering a wide range of subjects. If you are interested in reading fiction, books of travel, scientific books, history, biography, poetry, or just cook books, go to the high school library and look for what you want.

This year the library has subscriptions for 73 of the best magazines in the United States, and these, too, are of great variety and are in the library for the use of the whole community. If you haven't visited the library you should do so at the earliest opportunity.
