At the close of the sermon Dr. Fisher will administer holy communion, at which he will be assisted by the Rev. A. Lyall, the resident pastor. All members of the church, as well as visitors and friends, are invited to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Mrs. Lena Leonard Fisher, sister of Bishop H. W. Leonard, will address the evening gathering at 7:30 p. m., her subject being "Hold That Line." Dr. Lena Leonard Fisher has traveled extensively, not only in this country, where she is a national figure, as well known in Methodist circles in New York, Chicago and San Francisco as in Los Angeles, but also in the Orient, and is widely known as a brilliant speaker.

Mrs. Fisher leaves almost at once to give a course of lectures at Mills College in Oakland.

The musical number at both services will be of high merit. A duet, "Hark, Hark, My Soul," by Shelley, will be rendered by Mrs. Lena Leonard Fisher and Miss Leonarda Fisher, and Miss Fisher will sing and play in the evening service.


A cordial invitation is given to the people of Torrance to greet the visitors.


