

opportunity exists for getting the truth, the chairman of the code revision body said that the commission has sought impartially to make it necessary both for the prosecution and the defense to proceed to trial without recourse to evasion or dilatory tactics.

"AN entirely new plea relating to asserted insanity was proposed by Maj. Tuller and enthusiastically indorsed by the district attorneys. Under the new code as suggested an accused presenting a defense of insanity would be required to plead 'not guilty by reason of insanity,' thus admitting the crime and leaving to the jury the question only of determining the defendant's sanity at the time the crime was committed.

"Adoption of this amendment," Maj. Tuller said, "would mean that such a plea would be made only in cases of real insanity. It would tend effectually to block the efforts of an attorney knowingly representing a guilty client."

"OTHER changes suggested included a proposal to fix the number of peremptory challenges in criminal cases at two each for prosecution and defense and to five each in all other cases; an amendment relieving the court of the necessity for presenting instructions to the jury demanded by opposing counsel and leaving this function optional with the judge; an amendment making mandatory the co-operation of the district attorney with the attorney general in cases of appeal; an amendment requiring the trial judge to recommend to the parole board the minimum sentence which he believes the convicted person shall serve; and an amendment relating to the status and punishment of 'the habitual criminal, who,' Maj. Tuller said, 'is a fact and not a legal phrase.' "Concluding amid applause and shouts of approval, he said that the tentative code is submitted 'in all humility and with no pride of opinion, but solely with the idea of placing the emphasis on protection of the man who is becoming more and more the victim of organized crime—the law-abiding citizen.'"
