ORDINANCE No. 137

An Ordinance of the City of Torrance Amending Ordinance No. 110 of the City of Torrance.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 26 of Ordinance No. 110 of the City of Torrance is amended to read as follows:

"26. For the business of plumbing, contracting, electric wiring, contracting, or cement contracting, Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) per annum, payable semi-annually in advance. For the business of general contracting, Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) per annum, payable semi-annually in advance. For the business of painting, contracting, plastering, contracting, or roofing contractor, Twenty-Five Dollars (\$25.00) per annum, payable semi-annually in advance; provided that for the business of plumbing, contracting, general contracting and electric wiring contracting no license shall be issued hereunder until a bond in the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) approved by the Board of Trustees shall first have been filed with the City Clerk, which bond shall be conditioned upon the performance by the licensee of all work on buildings in the City of Torrance in accordance with the ordinances of the City of Torrance and of the County of Los Angeles, and of the laws of the State of California; and which bond shall be signed by a reputable bonding company as surety thereon."

SECTION 2. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance, and shall cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereupon and thereafter this ordinance shall be in full force and effect.


