Fine Programs For Hollywood Bowl This Week

Emil Oberhoffer Promises Music Lovers Brilliant Concerts

Emil Oberhoffer promises music lovers brilliant and elaborate programs during his second week as guest conductor in the Hollywood Bowl.

E. Robert Schmitz, renowned French pianist, will be the soloist, and will appear on July 15. When this young exponent of modern pianism was but 22 years old he organized and directed a choral society of mixed voices, and the following year he founded an orchestra of 80 pieces, 45 of whom were first prize winners at the conservatoire.

Mr. Schmitz first arrived in America in 1919, when he organized the Franco-American Musical Society, which has been active in promoting the interests of French and American musicians, both here and abroad.

While Mr. Schmitz' engagements during the past year have called him to points as far apart as Warsaw, Poland, and Portland, Oregon, this will be his first appearance in Southern California.

On Friday evening, July 16, Lucile Crews Marsh's symphonic elegy "To the Unknown Soldier," which won the Pulitzer prize last May, will be a part of the Bowl program. This prize carries with it a traveling scholarship of \$1500, and is offered by the Columbia University to the most talented and deserving composer in America. To Present New March On Saturday evening Emil Oberhoffer will direct his own composition, "The Bowl—A March of Homage," which he wrote in honor of Southern California's great community musical enterprise. "The underlying thought in my mind, as I composed this piece of music, was to show the forward strides of the community in music and civic affairs," says Mr. Oberhoffer. Interwoven in the march is the national hymn of liberty, "The Star Spangled Banner," and "America," which serve to emphasize the community spirit of the Bowl gatherings. The music is brilliant. The romantic side of the history of the Bowl is also brought out. Spanish instruments—castanets and tambourines—are used to express the old Spanish heritage and associations. The march is played by complete orchestra.






