ORDINANCE No. 139

An Ordinance of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrrence, Providing for the Levy and Collection of a Tax of Ten Cents on Each One Hundred Dollars of Assessed Valuation of Property for Parks, Music, and Advertising Purposes, and Providing for an Election To Be Held in the City of Torrrence to Determine Whether This Ordinance Shall Become Effective.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrrence do ordain as follows:

SECTION 1. There shall be levied and collected, in each succeeding year, beginning with the year 1927, and continuing until otherwise ordered by an ordinance of the City of Torrrence, a tax of ten cents on each one hundred dollars of assessed valuation of all property in the City of Torrrence taxable for municipal purposes, which tax shall be used only for park, music, and advertising purposes, as described in an Act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled "An Act Authorizing Municipal Corporations, other than freholder charter cities, to Levy and Collect a Tax for Park, Music and Advertising Purposes," approved April 10, 1911.

SECTION 2. The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrrence shall immediately call a special election under the provisions of said act above mentioned to determine whether this ordinance shall become effective, and until the said election shall have been held and a majority shall have voted in favor of making this ordinance effective the same shall not take effect. If the same shall be approved at said election then this ordinance shall take effect immediately as soon as the vote has been canvassed by the Board of Trustees and the result thereof declared by said Board.

SECTION 3. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Torrrence Herald.


