Shall the Ordinance No. 139, being, "An Ordinance of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, Providing for the Levy and Collection of a Tax of Ten Cents on each One Hundred Dollars of Assessed Valuation of Property for Parks, Music, and Advertising Purposes, and Providing for an Election to be Held in the City of Torrance to Determine Whether this Ordinance shall become Effective," heretofore adopted by the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance on July 26, 1926, be approved and become effective and a tax of Ten Cents on each One Hundred Dollars of Assessed valuation of all property in the City of Torrance, taxable for municipal purposes, be levied and collected each year thereafter until otherwise ordered by ordinance of the City of Torrance?"
