

How Power is Made from Water

SOME people have a notion that power companies do something to affect the water in mountain streams when they make power out of it. Nothing could be further from the fact.

Water, falling from one level to another may be made to turn a wheel. If a generator is attached to the wheel you have hydro (water)-electric power. Having turned the wheel, the stream goes on its way unchanged in quality and undiminished in volume. It is no more affected than the air which operates a windmill.

The power companies do not own any water. They merely have permission to extract the power which otherwise would be wasted. When water is used, oil and coal are saved and the public benefits from this conservation.

Fitts' Support In L.A. County Running Strong

Buron Fitts, candidate for the republican nomination for Lieutenant Governor, is rapidly gaining strength in Los Angeles County, as indicated by the formation within the last two weeks of 35 Fitts-for-Lieutenant-Governor Clubs in communities throughout the county.

Keith Carlin, campaign manager, declares that almost a score more Fitts clubs will be functioning in the county before the primaries, August 31.

Clubs now formed are at Alhambra, Arcadia, Avalon, Azusa, Bell, Burbank, Covina, Culver City, El Monte, Gardena, Girard, Glendale, Glendora, Hermosa Beach, Inglewood, Huntington Park, LaVerne, Maywood, Montebello, Montrose, Owensmouth, Pomona, Puente, Redondo, San Fernando, San Pedro, Santa Monica, Sawtelle, Sierra Madre, South Pasadena, Tujunga, Van Nuys, Venice, and Whittier.

Candidate Fitts will devote the remaining days of the primaries campaign, with the exception of three, to Southern California. On Monday, Aug. 23, he will be in Sacramento and Stockton, Tuesday in San Francisco, Palo Alto and San Jose, and Wednesday in Oakland and Fresno. He will swing south to San Diego August 26, and return to Los Angeles the following day.

In 1924, elected two years ago. Has made a successful record as judge.

P. E. KEELER, native of Ohio, attended Iowa and Utah Universities and the State Normal at Indiana, Pa. Court reporter in Ogden, Utah; graduate Boston University 1891. Resides in Long Beach. Member Phi Delta Phi law fraternity; belongs to all the York Rites, Masonic bodies, and an Elk.

SIDNEY N. REEVE, 12 years on Superior Court bench, served in the city prosecutor's office, elected justice of peace 1910, elected to present position 1912. Handled psychopathic and juvenile cases with credit, also the Burch and Obenchain murder trial.

RUBEN S. SCHMIDT, judge pro tem, for six years, native of Los Angeles, educated in Los Angeles schools. Graduated from the University of Michigan; 21 years law experience; unquestionably qualified as judge.

ALBERT LEE STEPHENS, a natural born judge, born in Compton. A U. S. C. Law graduate, township justice 1906, 1911 served on city service commission, city attorney for two terms. He is a Mason and an Elk. Serving his seventh year as judge of Superior Court. Now presiding judge.

FREDERICK C. VALENTINE saved taxpayers several millions of dollars in the Rindge Estate litigation. Elected in 1924 to Superior Court bench, he is held in high esteem by friends and associates.

MARION WESTOVER, deputy city attorney, appointed to the Municipal Court at its creation. Examiner State Railway Commission.

WILLIAM HAZLETT, appointed judge of the Superior Court May, 1926. A graduate of Iowa University. Six years city attorney of South Pasadena. President of the City Attorneys' Association of Southern California. He is a Mason.

EDWARD T. BISHOP, graduate Pomona High School and College. Judge of the short cause calendar department.

Judge Charles S. Crail today announced again his candidacy to succeed himself as Superior Court judge. In length of service on the bench he is one of the senior judges, and has served in all the departments, including his full term as presiding judge. In January next only one of the 28 Superior Court judges will have served longer than he.

His legal ability, his courtesy to litigants and lawyers who appear before him, and his patience are appreciated and are frequently spoken of in commendation. No one at any time has seen him harsh or ill-natured on the bench. He never magnifies his own importance.

Judge Crail is 48 years old. He lives in Los Angeles with his wife and three children.

He is a veteran of the Spanish-American War, having served in Cuba in 1898 and 1899, and a deacon in the Wilshire Boulevard Christian Church.


