

ORDINANCE No. 140

An Ordinance of the City of Torrance Amending Ordinance No. 12, by Adding Thereto a Section, Section 16b.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance do ordain as follows: SECTION 1. Ordinance No. 12 is hereby amended by adding thereto Section 16b, as follows: SECTION 16b. It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to allow any goats, sheep, cattle, or any other animal excepting dogs, to run at large, or to be tethered or confined in any manner at any place in the City of Torrance, within one hundred (100) feet of the dwelling house of any other person. SECTION 2. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and cause the same to be published once in the Torrance Herald, and thereupon and thereafter the same shall be in full force and effect.






