Southern California Fair At Riverside Sept. 21 to 26

RIVERSIDE.—Climaxing a week of superlative entertainment, the Southern California fair, to be held here Sept. 21 to 26, will offer on its closing day, Sunday, the greatest double attraction ever presented by any fair in Southern California. 
