**Railroad Official**  
**Passes Buck In**  
**Crossing Fight**

Changes Front in City's Demand for Much-Needed Easements

 of 1912 the city is asking for crossing rights at some 40 intersections in Torrance—including several on Cabrillo avenue and one at Post and Border and Redondo boulevard, where an extremely dangerous traffic hazard now exists.

Not long ago the company sent the city a deed to property at this point, it having been the company's understanding that in return for the deed the city would expend several thousand dollars for changing the company's tracks at the point to another type if the company paved the crossing. The deed was not accepted by the city, but a demand for the crossing rights as per the 1912 agreement was made.

**Change of Front**  
 In granting the deed to the city the P. E. made no mention of the railroad commission, whose consent to crossings Mr. Pontius now states is so necessary.

Torrance officials contend that the laws governing grade crossings are not intended to govern crossings of tracks which run longitudinally down a city street as the P. E. tracks do in Torrance, both on Redondo boulevard and Cabrillo avenue.

City Attorney Briney was authorized to inform the company of the city's contention, and City Engineer Frank Leonard will confer with P. E. engineers on the matter. This is the city's three-year effort to obtain badly needed crossings over the P. E. rights of way here frustrated by the Pacific Electric.
