

Fire Inspection Ordinance Passes

An ordinance requiring fire inspections at least twice a year of every building in Torrance was finally adopted by the Board of Trustees Tuesday night. The ordinance gives the fire department authority to order fire hazards in homes or other buildings removed, and provides penalties for disobedience of such orders. The board ordered three fire hydrants placed in the Cedar-Madrid district for the protection of the dwellings now being constructed.

People Asked to Vote \$20,000,000 Bonds for Home Loans to Vets

Proposition No. 1 on the November ballot authorizes the issuance of \$20,000,000 worth of bonds by the state of California for the continuance of the work of the California Veterans' Welfare Board. Ten million dollars in bonds was authorized four years ago, at the last general election, for the same work. The latter sum has been entirely allocated for the purchase of farms and homes under the provisions of the act authorizing the existence of the board, and no money is left to continue this work.

The veterans' home and farm aid act created the Veterans' Welfare Board and empowered it to handle the buying of homes and farms in the following manner: An ex-service man or woman who served in any war, who was in the military service prior to November 11, 1918, who has an honorable discharge, and who was a citizen of California both before and after his service, is eligible to make application for a home in the state of California to cost not more than \$5000, or for a farm in the state to cost not more than \$7500. The ex-service man is required to live on the property he acquires.

When an application from a veteran is received by the welfare board it is filed in the order in which it is received. The applicant, as soon as his turn arrives, notifies the board that he desires to secure a certain home or farm, indicating the location and giving the price, terms, and all requirements for the purchase. The board sends one of its members, a state inheritance tax appraiser and an executive officer of a bank to view the property and to make an independent appraisal. If this inspection shows that the property is worth not more than \$5000, and all conditions are proper in the opinion of the board, the house or farm is purchased for cash and the title to the home or farm taken in the name of the welfare board, which represents the state of California. The ex-service man immediately signs an agreement with the welfare board that he will purchase this property at the price for which it was bought by the state. He is allowed to pay for it in installments running over a period of twenty years, the payments amounting to about \$4.60 per month for every thousand dollars in the contract. This amount includes the principal and interest. He must keep his house insured and in habitable condition during the time he has the same.

No interest for State Should the bonds be voted by the people, the state is authorized to issue bonds to pay for the houses. These bonds bear interest at the rate of 4 1/2 percent. The service man pays 5 percent on all the unpaid installments on his contract. The one-half of 1 percent is sufficient to pay for all of the overhead and the administration charges incurred by the welfare board. The state, therefore, pays all charges and costs from the money received from the ex-service men, even the cost of running the board and administering the disposition of the bonds and the money. The taxpayers can not, therefore, be spending any money they do not receive in return, while at the same time they are creating an economic wealth that could not be otherwise secured. Most of the men and women who are eligible and who take advantage of the act are not able otherwise to secure such homes or farms.

This house or farm may be sold by the veteran, but he must secure enough to pay off the state, the unpaid balance of the contract. The contract may be assigned by and with the consent of the welfare board. Disabled men are given the preference over able-bodied men in the allocation of houses or farms.

Past National Commander John R. Quinn is now chairman of the Veterans' Welfare Board, with offices in the Rives-Strong building in Los Angeles, whose telephone number is Metropolitan 1417. Both the Republican and Democratic parties in the state of California have this year endorsed and recommended the passage of Proposition No. 1. The State Federation of Labor has endorsed the measure, as have many other organizations, leading bankers and individuals, including the Los Angeles Realty Board and the Federated State Societies.


