Club Hears Talk On Center's Work

Mrs. George L. Eastman of Hollywood, first vice-president of the Mothers' Educational Association, gave a resume of the aims and work of the association before the Women's Club Wednesday afternoon.

There are 27 Mothers' Educational Centers in Los Angeles and vicinity, and since its organization 80,000 mothers have received help from the association. Nine thousand babies have been brought to these centers in the past year.

These centers are not for sick babies, but to help the mother to keep her baby well by educating her as to the proper care of her baby. This service is free, and all mothers are invited to bring their babies to the centers, which are for not only babies but children up to school age.

THE JUSTICE COURT
