

1927 Opening Up Big New Era In Methods of Communication

January has seen remarkable development in the field of communication. First came trans-Atlantic telephone service between New York City and London; then the Bell system announced the opening of two more telegraph stations, one at Atlanta, Ga., and one in Los Angeles, bringing the total number of stations up to seven for the transmission of pictures between a number of the largest population centers in the nation. The other day the Bell system held the formal opening of the northern transcontinental lines, linking the east with the Pacific northwest through the new circuit which terminates at Seattle.

When the new transcontinental telephone line connecting the Pacific coast with the Atlantic seaboard was officially opened, President Walter S. Gifford of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, using the same telephone that recently transmitted his voice across the Atlantic ocean in publicly opening the telegraph service from New York to London, officially dedicated the new line from his office in New York by congratulating J. W. Spangler, president of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, and E. B. Wilcox, president of the Portland body. Gifford then introduced them through additional telephone connections to John W. O'Leary, president of the United States Chamber of Commerce, at Washington, D. C., who talked with the officials of the northwestern commercial bodies and prominent telephone officials over the new line.

The opening of this new telephone line marks a milestone in the progress and development of the Pacific northwest and the whole Pacific coast. In order to keep pace with the growing demand for transcontinental communication service it was considered necessary to construct an additional line by the northern route.

Starting on the east coast, the northern transcontinental line makes its way westward via Chicago, Minneapolis, Fargo and Bismarck (N. D.), Glendive, Billings, Helena and Missoula (Mont.), and Spokane (Wash.). From Bismarck to the Pacific coast the line generally follows the route of the Lewis and Clark expedition. It is interesting to note that the time required in building the line closely approximates the time consumed by the Lewis and Clark expedition in making their famous journey through this territory in 1804-5.

It has been necessary to build the line in such a manner that it will withstand the deep snows and temperatures of 50 degrees below zero at some points and of more than 100 degrees above zero at other points.

In passing over the Bitter Mountains at Bonanza Pass an elevation of 8572 feet is reached, while over the transcontinental divide at McDonald Pass the line reaches an elevation of 8353 feet.

At certain places along the line there is also the hazard of forest fires, and it has been necessary to take adequate measures to prevent interruptions of service from that cause.

In building this line all the modern machinery available was utilized, as, for example, pole hole diggers, heavy trucks equipped with winches and pole trailers. The use of these modern innovations made the construction of this line especially rapid.
