
Just how the condition may be remedied is difficult to see, but the situation is such that it merits careful study by all who are interested in Torrance.

How to Play BRIDGE

A new series of lessons by Wynne Ferguson Author of "PRACTICAL AUCTION BRIDGE"

ARTICLE No. 19

Every once in a while you will hold a hand with which, by a little quick thinking, you can make a big gain.

Hearts—K, 7 Clubs—10, 8, 7, 3 Diamonds—K, 10, 4 Spades—A, 8, 6, 5

Would you pass, as most players would do, or would you bid two no-trump? The purpose of the latter bid, is to shut out a bid of two hearts or two diamonds by fourth hand.

The writer has frequently warned his readers of the dangers of pre-emptive bids unless properly used. Here is a hand that illustrates the point:

Y: Hearts—A, 9, 8, 2 Clubs—A, J, 10, 4 Diamonds—A, 6, 3 Spades—A, 7 Z: Hearts—K, 7 Clubs—10, 8, 7, 3 Diamonds—K, 10, 4 Spades—A, 8, 6, 5

If there were no score, rubber game, what would you bid with Z's hand, as dealer? This hand is not one with which to make a pre-emptive bid of five clubs.

Here is a most unusual hand, in that there is only one way to make game. See if you can figure it out:

Problem No. 23 Hearts—Q, 7, 4 Clubs—K, 6, 3 Diamonds—K, J, 9, 7 Spades—6, 4, 2

No score, rubber game. Z dealt and bid one no-trump. All passed, and A opened the eight of spades.

Problem No. 24 Hearts—J, 7 Clubs—Q, 10, 8 Diamonds—7, 5 Spades—10, 9

Hearts are trumps and Z is in the lead. How can Y-Z win six of the nine tricks against any defense? Solution in the next article.

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION No. 315 (Madrid Avenue)

A Resolution of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, California, Declaring Its Intention to Order the Improvement of a Portion of Madrid Avenue Within Said City.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance, California, pursuant to the "Improvement Act of 1911 and the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," do resolve, declare and determine as follows:

SECTION 1. That the public interest and convenience require and that it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the City of Torrance to order the following work to be done and improvement to be made within said City, to-wit:

That Madrid Avenue, from a point fifteen (15) feet South of the City of Torrance, California, pursuant to the "Improvement Act of 1911 and the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," do resolve, declare and determine as follows:

SECTION 2. That the said proposed work or improvement in the opinion of the said Board of Trustees, is of more than local or private public benefit, and the costs and expenses of said proposed work or improvement is hereby made chargeable upon a district, which said district the said Board of Trustees hereby declares to be the district benefited by the said proposed work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, which said district comprises the following described lots:

All of Lots 14 to 21 inclusive in Block 52, Lots 1 to 8 inclusive in Block 53, Lots 1 to 10 inclusive in Block 56, Lots 13 to 22 inclusive in Block 57, Lot 1, and Lots 17 to 26 inclusive in Block 60, Lots 6 to 16 inclusive in Block 61, Lots 14 to 20 inclusive in Block 65, Lots 12 to 20 inclusive in Block 78, Lots 1 to 9 inclusive in Block 79, Lots 7 to 12 inclusive in Block 82 and Lots 15 to 20 inclusive in Block 83.

All of the above mentioned lots being in Torrance Tract, as recorded in Map Book 22, at pages 94 and 95, in the office of the County Recorder of the County of Los Angeles. Also Lots 13 and 16 of Tract No. 4584 as recorded in Map Book 54, Page 54, Los Angeles County Records.

SECTION 3. Notice is hereby given that serial bonds to represent unpaid assessments and to bear interest at the rate of seven (7) per cent per annum, will be issued hereunder in the manner provided by the "Improvement Bond Act of 1915," the last installment of which said bonds shall mature nine (9) years from the 2nd day of July next succeeding ten (10) months from their date.

SECTION 4. Notice is hereby given that on Tuesday, the 15th day of March, 1927, at 8 P. M. in the Council Chamber of the City Hall of the said City of Torrance, California, any and all persons having any objection to the proposed work or improvement may appear before the said Board of Trustees and show cause why said proposed work or improvement should not be carried out in accordance with this resolution.

SECTION 5. The City Clerk shall cause this Resolution of Intention to be published twice in the Torrance Herald, a weekly newspaper published and circulated in the said City and hereby designated for the purpose by the said Board of Trustees of said City.

The Board of Trustees do not deem it advisable that the Clerk mail copies to the owners or the reputed owners, and the City Clerk need not mail copies of said notice.

The Street Superintendent of the said City is hereby directed to post notices of Improvement as required by statute.


