Then a special shoe was applied with a built-up sole, which enabled Albert to get about quickly and helped to balance the weight of his body more correctly. With this strain removed real improvement began, and it is believed that careful attention to the boy's general health, with proper exercise, will eradicate all trace of his trouble without the necessity of operation.

While in the hospital-school Albert continued his regular school work in the school department of the institution without loss of time, and this has enabled him to take up his school work again in Lennox without losing pace with his chums because of lost time. He will return to the clinic regularly for checking up of his condition, where he has made many warm friends among the children and workers.
