All-Year Club Will Use Papers In Ad Campaign

122,000,000 Displays Will Boost Southern California in the East

LOS ANGELES.—Los Angeles County will be mentioned in all of the 122,000,000 newspaper advertisements that are now running as part of the advertising campaign of the All-Year Club of Southern California. These advertisements are in newspapers in 74 cities throughout the east and middle west. The newspaper campaign which has just been launched is supplemented by advertising in the magazines which is equal in volume to that of the newspapers. In addition to being mentioned in all of the advertising on the coupon by which persons can make specific inquiry, there are many pictures of Los Angeles County scenes ad-

ditional in the magazine advertising. The effectiveness of the advertising may be partly gleaned from the fact that during the year 1926 there were 118,588 general inquiries about Southern California, and 38,410 specific inquiries about Los Angeles County. "As in past years," said C. G. Milham, executive secretary of the All-Year Club, "the advertising, on appearance, will be entirely for tourists. But the appeal is so framed that it attracts tourists of means. As in the past, a substantial percentage of all who come to Southern California as tourists may be expected to stay as permanent residents. Los Angeles County may confidently look forward toward its share of these."

Seek to Raise \$600,000 by Sale Of Red Poppies

SAN FRANCISCO.—With a national goal of \$600,000 in mind, veterans of the World War are busy with plans for the annual sale of red memorial poppies on Memorial Day for the benefit of disabled ex-service men and women and the families of the dead and disabled, according to James K. Flak, state adjutant of the American Legion.

Disabled veterans in government hospitals in many states, including California, are making the poppies from materials supplied by the American Legion's Women's Auxiliary. The disabled and sick veterans are paid for the poppies. Hospitals which have no veterans' hospitals will be supplied from those that have the government institutions located in them, according to Flak.



The Boy Scout rally conducted last Friday evening in the auditorium of the elementary school, at which 70 scouts, 64 parents and a number of interested friends were present, was won by Troop No. 4, with five out of the six major contests and all of the games. Charles Kissinger won the traction tire and knife work contest, Egbert Merrill and Merton Gilbert the signaling contest, James Baguley the knot-tying contest, and the troop color guard (Raymond Flood, Robert Hannan and Charles Kissinger) the honor of presenting the colors. Five second class and six first class badges, 37 merit badges, two Star and one Life badges were presented—a remarkable showing for one month's activity. Troop 3 was the host to the scouts present after the conclusion of the evening's program.

The swimming program is an attractive feature of local activity, a number of Torrance scouts being enrolled in the swimming classes conducted on Monday evenings in the Anderson plunge in San Pedro. Swimming awards in the form of ribbons were presented at the rally to several local scouts for first, second and third places in a recent swimming contest night. In addition to red, white and blue ribbons representing membership in the Torrance scout team that won first place in a recent intercity contest.

The drum and bugle corps is meeting regularly on Thursday evenings from 6 to 7 under the leadership of Dallas Danford and Raymond Flood, to whom musician badges were presented at the rally. The corps is expecting to participate in the Boys' Week parade.

Two special contests for the June rally are attracting considerable attention from local scouts: the annual oratorical, and the annual Red Cross first aid.

The oratorical contest is patterned after the Constitutional contest now on in the public schools. The plan is to conduct elimination contests in each troop, and the troop winners to compete at the June rally. The Torrance winner will receive a bronze medal and \$10 in cash. The subject is "Why I Believe in Scouting." A minimum of five minutes and a maximum of ten minutes is provided in the posted conditions.

The conditions of the Red Cross first aid contest are posted—troop teams of three members, with medals for the winners in addition to having the name of the troop and the team members engraved on the trophy, which will provide for 12 annual contests.

The conditions for the examination to be conducted in connection with the three-weeks summer hike through the Sierra Madre Mountains, on which hike places are reserved for eight Torrance scouts, are posted. The hike leaves Sierra Madre on Monday, June 27, and membership in the party is limited to first class scouts who pass the examination provided. The camp fee is \$25, and the scout passing with the highest grade goes on the trip without payment of any kind. The trip is undertaken as an educational as well as a recreational effort, and is the eighth trip of like kind that has been conducted by the district commissioner, who is in charge of the trip this year. One of the examination conditions is that every member of the party know how to pack a burro, and a dummy burro for practice purposes has been provided local scouts at the Scout building.

Inasmuch as Troops 1 and 4 have completed their membership quota of 33 scouts each, definite steps toward the organization of another troop will be started next week, the troop to be sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. The troop will be known as Troop 2.

The troop standing, under the point plan, up to and including last Saturday, for the present month, is as follows: Troop 1, 178; Troop 3, 99; and Troop 4, 150. The Troop 1 score is the highest monthly score that has ever been made in the harbor district.
