Seek to Prevent Youths From Auto Ride Soliciting

An order was issued Saturday, May 7, by the chief of police of Los Angeles that will probably be followed by like action on the part of county officials.

This order directs that all boys or girls soliciting rides from motorists, in violation of Section 10 of the city traffic ordinance, shall be taken by the police officer who finds them doing such soliciting to the principal of the school, to whom the officer shall report each case. Pupils so reported will be severely dealt with by the principals of the Los Angeles city schools.
