



**YOUNG ACTOR
ADOPTS TEAM
AT CATALINA**

**Junior Coghlan Is Official
Mascot of Torrance Nine
in Two Games**

With Junior Coghlan, young motion picture star, acting as official mascot and one of the most vociferous rooters for the team, Torrance broke even in holiday games with the Catalina Cubs at Catalina Island Sunday and Monday.

Torrance got a bad break in the Sunday game and lost it 5 to 6. The boys went on the field in an unbeatable combination on Monday, however, and plastered the Cubs 12 to 5.

In the second game Hine allowed the Cubs only five hits, while his teammates were pounding Stuebe, the Catalina hurler, for 13 safeties.

Manager Ed Tansey, who cut short a visit to Seattle and made a flying automobile trip down the coast in three days in order to be with the team at Catalina, expressed himself as highly pleased with the games and with the reception given the team at the island.

Junior Coghlan, who has starred in "Slide Kelly Slide" and "The Yankee Clipper," and who rooted the team to victory on Monday, was recruited while the local outfit was on the boat. The young motion picture star, learning that a baseball team was aboard, searched out Manager Tansey and applied for the job of mascot. Tansey signed him up at once, and, with the consent of his father, Junior remained with the team during its stay in Catalina.

It was Junior's team while it was in Catalina, and he was announced as the mascot both at the playing field and at several places of amusement on the island.

The Torrance team was met at the boat by the Cubs, and marched in uniform in a parade led by Catalina city officials. Manager Harry D. Diffin of the Cubs, who has been connected with organized baseball for 60 years, waxed enthusiastic over the brand of baseball displayed by the Torrance nine, and described the team as one of the most sportsmanlike of any that had ever visited the island.
