Nash Announces 3 Brand New Series of Cars

Twenty-one Models on Four Different Chassis Lengths Are Included

Three entirely new series of cars, including 21 models on four different chassis lengths, are announced by the Nash Motors Company.

The new series will be known as the Advanced Six, the Special Six, and the Standard Six, and despite a wide array of costly improvements these cars are also featuring new lower prices, the reductions ranging as high as \$195.00.

A new radiator design, lower and more sweeping body lines, and a brilliant array of new color combinations make these new models the most beautiful ever produced by Nash.

Important mechanical refinements and improvements are also announced at this time, keeping pace with the progress which has been made in increasing the beauty of the car's appearance. Outstanding among these are the introduction of new springs of a secret alloy steel which is said to increase riding comfort in amazing degree.

The new body lines are lower and more sweeping than ever before, and the wheels are smaller, giving an additional appearance of lowness to the cars, although interior roominess has not been sacrificed.

Matching the beauty of line is the new array of color combinations. Many striking new harmonies are used.

The radiator design of the Standard Six causes this series now to possess a beauty of appearance which not long ago was confined entirely to cars costing two or three times as much.

The size of the motor in the Standard Six has been increased, giving it a degree of performance ability which, according to Nash officials, is entirely new to this price field.

In addition to increasing the size of the motor, the size of the crankshaft has also been made larger to achieve motor smoothness. The crankshaft will, of course, continue to be of the seven-bearing type which has made Nash smoothness famous.

The new springs of secret alloy steel will be used on the Standard Six as well as on the Special Six and the Advanced Six for increased riding comfort. Another contribution in this respect is the use of shock absorbers at the front as standard equipment.

The Standard Six motor is now insulated from the frame at all points of contact with rubber, providing a quieter operation and saving the motor from road shocks.

Notes on California Roads Furnished by National Auto Club

Famed for the variety of its fishing waters and the majesty of its scenery, the Rock Creek and Convict Lake areas are now claiming the attention of many fishermen and vacationists.

On its plunging path it forms many pools where rainbow trout hide in the cool depths. Convict and McGee Creeks, which enter Long Valley a few miles above the gorge, provide wonderful sport. Convict Lake is one of the most popular lakes in this district. This lake received its name because of a battle which occurred there between a gang of escaped convicts and a posse of settlers. Mt. Morrison, located near by and rising to a height of 12,245 feet, was named for one of the posse who was killed in the fight. At "Tom's Place," where the main highway crosses Rock Creek, a good automobile trail has had into the back country, reaching lower Rock Creek Lake. Here, and also in the long chain of lakes above, may be found excellent trout fishing. Near by are Hilton Lakes, reached by a good trail.

Here Is Evil News For Bungling Gents

PASADENA, June 30.—After five years of effort Dr. Robert L. Burt, research fellow in electro-chemistry at the California Institute of Technology, announces he has succeeded in perfecting a unique burglar alarm that gives its warning whenever an intruder walks through one of several light rays reflected about a room or building by a series of mirrors.

The secret of the device lies in the photo-electric cell housed in a box resembling an ordinary radio receiver. Beneath the box a spotlight directs its rays across the room to strike a mirror, where the ray is reflected to many other mirrors, the last mirror sending its ray into a small opening in one end of the box. In the box the ray strikes the photo-electric cell, which looks like an ordinary light bulb. So long as the ray of light strikes this cell an electric current is passing through the cell, but the instant that a person walking through any one of the light beams cuts off the ray the current ceases and the alarm is given.

Golden, steelhead, rainbow, eastern brook, and Lochleven.

The main highway between El Centro and Imperial is now open, eliminating the rough and dusty detour via the Date Canal road.

General fishing conditions are fair at Dry Meadow, Tobias, South and Girish Creeks, Kern River, and Edison Dam. Sidman eggs and worms are best bait, and royal codman and black grout are best fly. Water in the Kern River is still too high for fly fishing, but on some of the smaller streams flies are being taken with flies. Average temperature in this district, 76.

On the route between Tia Juana and Escondido the first 15 miles to Rosarito Ranch are of fair dirt and gravel, with rough stretches. The balance of the distance is over fair dirt roads, with several short, shaly grades and numerous rough stretches. Motorists desiring to proceed south of Tia Juana must secure from the American customs officer on the American side a permit covering automobile and contents. This permit is good for four days unless a longer visit is arranged through a customs house teacher.

Read conditions are now good between San Diego and Cuyamaca Lake. The road from San Diego to Warren's Hot Springs is very rough.

The Montezuma Springs grade job is progressing so rapidly that the road will be open and maintained by June 30.

From San Diego to Palomar the east and west grades are both open, but the east grade is still in progress, and a dusty detour is in effect.

Torrance to Have New Taxi Service
The Torrance Taxicab Company, under the direction of W. T. Woodard, will open a taxi service for Torrance and vicinity Tuesday, July 5.
The taxi stand will be opposite the Pacific Electric station on Border avenue, and the telephone number is 400.
Mr. Woodard stated that two cars would be put into service at once and additional cars added as the service warranted. The location, opposite the Pacific Electric station, will be a convenience to passengers arriving by interurban, as Mr. Woodard stated that there would be a taxi on duty as late as the last car arriving in Torrance.
