## Put Out Your Fires! Vacation Period Is Forest Fire Season

SACRAMENTO, July 7.—Keep your muffler cut-out closed and put out your fires!  
California motorists about to leave the grind of the city for the cool fastnesses of the mountain forests were urged to accept this bit of advice today by Frank G. Snook, chief of the division of motor vehicles.  
With the summer vacation season in full swing, Snook declared greater care than ever before will be needed if disastrous fires are to be prevented.  
"Fortunately," he said, "most of the newer types of cars are not equipped with a muffler cut-out. But many of the older ones have them, and disastrous fires are known to have resulted from flying sparks when they were left open."  
"It is now conceded that they accomplish no good purpose. The legislature, recognizing this, has condemned their use after January, 1927."  
There will be 11 percent more cars on the highways this summer than last year, he said, due to the increased registrations. He urged smokers to equip their cars with proper receptacles for burning cigarette stubs and matches.  
The 200 traffic officers of the division are co-operating with the state department of forestry in preventing and putting out fires.

## Radio Is Installed For Pres. Coolidge

Although President Coolidge will be miles from a railroad or town all summer in the Black Hills of South Dakota, he will be able to spend his evenings listening to concerts being given in the metropolitan centers of the country, because of the activities of the radio industry. A receiving set designed by Dr. F. A. Kolster, formerly head of the United States Bureau of Standards radio laboratory and now chief research engineer of Federal-Brandes, Inc., has been installed in the state game lodge for the President's personal use.  
Since the appointment of the Federal Radio Commission Mr. Coolidge has taken a keen interest in radio, listening in often at the White House with a set built by the Bureau of Standards. In order to provide him and Mrs. Coolidge with entertainment after a day of fishing or hiking in the picturesque Black Hills, arrangements were made to place the Kolster receiver in the summer White House as soon as it was announced that he would spend his vacation there.

## Com. Slavich Issues Call for Veterans' Annual Convention

SAN FRANCISCO, July 7.—The call for the ninth annual state convention of the American Legion, to be held at Santa Barbara August 2-4, has gone forth from Dr. John F. Slavich, state commander of the Legion.  
Delegates from the three hundred odd posts of the World War veterans' organization in this state will attend the annual convocation, according to Commander Slavich. Policies of the Legion for the coming year will be formulated and new department officers, including state commander, will be elected, as will five area commanders and 22 district commanders and vice-commanders.
