Enough to Eat!

The greatest number of under-nourished children do not eat ENOUGH food to care for their bodily needs.

"Never still a minute" indicates the need of fuel to burn.

"Growing like a weed" indicates the need of nourishment for growth.

A make-shift breakfast of coffee and rolls, or none at all; a hurried "appetite stayer" lunch, means that the child has failed to get more than half of his day's food needs. It is demanding too much of a child's digestive tract to take most of his day's food at one time, even if his stomach were able to handle it.

A growing child needs a well balanced diet, and plenty of it, all the time. An average six-year old child can be well nourished if he gets his three to four cupsfuls of whole milk; an egg a day, a small serving of lean meat such as lamb, chicken, beef; (finely cut) fish, such as halibut or cod; one to two cups of whole grain cereals (part used in puddings); a starchy vegetable as potato; cooked green vegetables; fruits, stewed or baked, twice a day; four to six slices of bread, dry or toasted (depending on child's needs); butter, one to two tablespoons; sugar, a small quantity on fruits, in plain cookies or simple candy after meal; occasional ice creams as dessert. Always extras in milk, cereals, bread and butter.

Starch foods should be sparingly used by the obese parent. They, however, must be remembered as "calorie" friends of the growing child; yet should not be allowed to crowd out the growth promoting foods.

Excessive sweets and highly seasoned foods sate the child's appetite before his needs are met. Eating all day long is certain to lessen the calories.

A child is a keen critic of foods. It is well to resort to variety of fruits and vegetables; surprises in the combinations of starchy foods. Wholesome, bland foods must always be well cooked to insure continued eating.

## Motor Officers Ready for New Highway Laws

### Preparations Made by Motor Vehicles Division to Carry Out New Legislation

Sacramento, Aug. 4.—All departments of the Division of Motor Vehicles have made preparations for the enforcement of the new motor vehicle act which becomes effective July 29.

The division's force of more than 200 officers was prepared to enforce the new 40-mile speed limit, having received instructions from Francis J. Snook, chief of the division, that no motorists are to be allowed to exceed that limit. The clerical force had ordered new supplies preparatory to carrying out the new provisions relative to registration and keeping the records.

It will now be mandatory for the applicant to give examinations to all applicants for new drivers' licenses after the law becomes effective. Applications received up to midnight tonight will be recognized as coming under the old law.

The division may, if it deems it desirable, cancel the operator's card of any driver who has had a card for three years and require him to take an examination as to his physical and mental fitness to drive.

Drivers who have lost their licenses and make application for renewal may also be subjected to an examination at the discretion of the division.

Likewise, the division may require the non-resident, who has never secured a license in California before to take an examination.

Another important change in the new motorists "bible" provides that any persons convicted of reckless driving three times within a period of twelve months shall automatically lose his license, the law classifying him as an habitually reckless driver. A conviction of speeding cannot be counted against the motorist in such cases.

Juries are given power to fix the punishment in cases of conviction for driving while intoxicated. This provision was added as a means of securing more convictions as it was found that under the old law, which classed the offense as a felony punishable by a prison sentence, juries were reluctant to bring in verdicts of guilty.

The division also prepared to comply with another section of the new act requiring that a complete record of accidents involving injury and death be kept with the causes and locations. Motorists involved in such accidents are now required to make a report to police officials and failure is deemed a misdemeanor. Police officials must, in turn, report to the division. This will stop the "covering up" of accidents.

Garages and parking stations are required under the new law to keep a record of cars stored longer than 12 hours and to report to the police when a car has been stored longer than 30 days if the name and address of the owner is unknown.

Another provision, aimed at the stolen car evil, requires dealers to give notice of the sale of used cars to the division. Notice was required on new cars only under the old law.

It is likewise made a misdemeanor to withhold a certificate of ownership when the purchaser is entitled to it.

Muffler cut-outs must be eliminated from all cars under the act by January 1, 1929.

According to best information received by the division, the Wagby bill, which made material changes in the fee paid by commercial trucks, will not go into effect Friday as enough signatures to hold it up by referendum are said to have been secured. In this case, Snook announced, the division will adhere to the present fee schedule in the motor vehicle act until the Wagby bill has been decided at the November election in 1928.

## County Receives Lions' Share Road Maintenance Funds

### Sacramento, Aug. 4.—California was today assured of an adequate road repair and maintenance program for the coming year in an announcement by Alexander R. Heron, director of finance, that the sum of \$5,486,528.77, collected during the first six months of the year in motor vehicle registration fees, is now ready for distribution to the state highway commission and the various counties for road purposes.

Of this huge amount, all of which was paid in by the motorists of the state \$3,063,638 will go directly to the highway commission. A similar amount will be apportioned to the counties but funds reserved for the payment of salaries of traffic officers will cut the net share of the counties to \$2,424,678.69.

Salaries of the officers for the six-month period amounted to \$302,348.22 and the additional sum of \$334,823.17 is being reserved for the same purpose during the last six months of the year.

"We feel that this is money well spent in view of the tremendous importance of preserving safety on the highways," said a statement issued by Heron.

The apportionment is based on the highest registrations in the history of the state the totals being as follows: Passenger cars, 1,385,894; solid trucks, 36,225; pneumatic trucks, 162,604; motorcycles, 8,122; trailers, 29,570.

Because Los Angeles County registered more than one-third of all the vehicles, it will receive the lion's share, a total of \$1,215,892.76. San Francisco is second with \$237,721.47.

## Registration Begins for State Bar Act

The registration of all persons entitled to practice law in California was commenced on July 30 pursuant to the provisions of the State Bar act, which went into effect July 29, when the State Bar Commission sent out registration cards to upwards of 11,000 lawyers throughout the state. With this registration card was a bill for an organization fee of \$3, which is required to be paid by every person now entitled to practice law in this state.

Under the provisions of the State Bar Act "all persons now entitled to practice law in this state are members and "no person shall practice law in this state subsequent to the first meeting of the State Bar unless he shall be an active member thereof."

Active membership is completed by the filling in and signing of the registration card and its transmission to the offices of the State Bar Commission, accompanied by a remittance of \$3 organization fee. Upon registration and payment of the fee on or before November 18, 1927, which is the date fixed for the organization meeting, a certificate of membership will be mailed to each person registering and paying the fee evidencing his membership until two months after the date of the organization meeting of the State Bar.

On or before November 16, 1927, a member of the Board of Governors must be voted for in each congressional district, except that in the county of Los Angeles and the city and county of San Francisco, which each contain two congressional districts, members will be entitled to vote for two members of the board.

Only members who have completed their registration and paid their organization fee on or before October 1, 1927, will be entitled to vote for members of the Board of Governors. Under the provisions of the act members are required to vote in the district of their residence and not in that in which they maintain their offices.

Commissioners as members of the State Bar Commission were issued by Mr. Chief Justice William H. Waste of the Supreme Court on Friday, July 29, following the going into effect of the act, to Charles A. Beardsley of Oakland, vice-president of the California Bar Association; Kemper Campbell of Los Angeles, president of the Los Angeles Bar Association; Thomas C. Ridgway of Los Angeles, president of the California Bar Association, and Joseph J. Webb of San Francisco.

These four prominent members of the bar, with Mr. Chief Justice Waste, constitute the commission to put the State Bar Act into effect. Andrew Y. Wood of San Francisco, managing editor of "The Recorder," is the secretary.
