## Valves Used In Lindbergh Plane Used in Buicks

**Heat Resisting Qualities Which Aided Byrd Also a Buick Feature**

The heat-resisting "S" steel valves which made possible the recent triumphs of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, Commander Richard E. Byrd, and the other trans-oceanic fliers are at the service of every Buick owner, for they have been standard exhaust equipment on Buick for several years. They are an unseen but highly important factor in the long-sustained performance of Buick's famous six-cylinder valve-in-head engine.

Buick became interested in the "S" steel valve, made by Thompson Products, Inc., through tests conducted by the United States Bureau of Aeronautics, at Anacostia, Md. The result of these tests was adoption of the new valve by every American aircraft engine maker, and by several foreign makers. For the tests showed that this valve's use jumped the life of the aircraft engine—while during the World War averaged about five hours—more than 50 hours. Today the life of an aircraft engine is 200 hours or more, so great has been the progress in valve development. If they could be seen in operation, they would be found a brilliant cherry red much of the time.

The best exhaust valves hitherto obtainable would run a few thousand miles and then lose efficiency as their steel gave way before the blast of fire.

After "destruction" runs in aircraft engines, which completely ruined the ordinary valve, the Thompsons were still in perfect condition. Their stems had taken on a glossy, mirror-like shine, which resisted wear. They were unwrapped, unburned, and entirely unimpaired in efficiency. In operation, their faces showed a tendency to conform to the slightest irregularities in the block seat, making a tight seal. They were, also, lighter than other valves, and consequently they operated more quietly. They would run six times as long as ordinary valves without re-grinding.

**SCHOOL LUNCHEES**  
School lunches must be thought of in terms of well-nourished children. Whether feeding "blue ribbon" children, the rules are the same. The school lunch should be as well planned as the other two meals eaten at home.  
A child is unlikely to be adequately fed if he chooses food with no knowledge of what to eat, no matter how excellent the cafeteria. Children of elementary schools especially need help in selecting their lunches.  
The plate lunch for a that rate is the best solution for young children's lunches. By such a plan, only are they certain of getting enough of the right kind of food every noon. Undirected choosing often results in the child's buying expensive sweets or an unbalanced ration of potatoes, gravy, roll, ice cream and candy.  
A nourishing cream soup, sandwich, vegetable and dessert could be had for the same money.  
The "lunch work" is a very important part of teaching health in the schools. Food is not alone provided, but also the opportunity to teach children how to eat for health. The lunch-room teacher is a valuable addition to the faculty. New habits and new tastes are

instilled when an understanding dietitian teaches children what fun it is to eat right. Being a good selector of food is as splendid a distinction as being a good speller.  
Food must always be well cooked and attractively served to keep children eating up to par. Poor cooking will spoil the reputation of any good dish. A child will not eat food just because he needs it. Children as well as adults "buy by eye." Food that is good for them must look good to them.  
A child learns social habits as well as food habits in a well ordered cafeteria. He is less apt to bolt his food and rush to play when seated with an interesting social group of his kind.  
The child's eating always, need direction. He cannot eat just as he pleases even one in three meals during his school years and have good nutrition.—Christmas Seal Service.
