No wardrobe is complete these days without the quota of stylish rainy-day apparel and what stunning equipment the mode is turning out to protect from the rain. One of the very latest summer items is the rainbow cape. This is a long modified circular silhouette of gossamer weight and in dainty coloring which looks as if it had caught the tones and tints of the rainbow on its blue-of-the-sky background. The advantage of this cape is being sleeveless, it does not crush the fluffiest dress underneath. This type makes a charming beach wrap. The striking rain ensemble in the picture is of handsome ombre plaid rubberized crepe de chine—something very new and distinctive brought out this season. It is fashionable to wear a hat to match the coat. The model which tops the coat in the illustration has a ripple trim and is warranted to add a touch of color beauty to even the most dismal of rainy-day scenes.
