

Steering Is Easy for Nash Drivers

Easy, "fast" steering, long a characteristic of Nash cars, is even more evident in the 21 new models recently introduced.

Nash engineers have concentrated on overcoming the "shag" of low pressure tires on the road, without resorting to the expedient of changing the gearings so that the steering wheel must be turned through a long arc in order to turn the front wheels. The Nash front wheels are equipped by little more than a single turn of the steering wheel. This has been accomplished at no sacrifice to easy steering, since it requires no more effort than was needed when old-style high pressure tires were used. Parking is said to be much easier

with the Nash type of steering. Women drivers who have piloted the new Nash models are outspoken in their appreciation of the easy steering, and they like also those details of convenience such as the light controls in the center of the handsome steering wheel, the ease and surety with which the brakes may be applied, the almost effortless operation of the clutch, the convenient location of the long parking brake lever, and the grouping of the instruments, all under glass.

These details of refinement and improvement are in keeping with the usual quality found throughout Nash construction, and serve to enhance the enjoyment of the 7-bearing crankshaft motor with which each model is equipped.

America Surpasses Remainder of World For Phone Service

Out of a total of 27,783,963 telephones in the entire world on January 1, 1926, the United States possesses considerably more than half. There were on that date 16,935,918 telephones in this country, or 61% of the world's total. The number of telephones in Europe on the same date was 7,479,690, or 27% of the world's total, the remaining 12% being scattered over the globe in Asia, Africa, Oceania, South America and countries in North America outside of the United States. During the year 1925 the number of telephones in the world increased by 1,727,465, or over 6%, a remarkable growth when it is remembered that there were only 1,700,000 telephones in the world at the beginning of the century.

The figures used in the foregoing statement are taken from a recently published compilation of telephone and telegraph statistics of the world. It has taken some time to obtain authoritative data from the more distant countries and so the most recent data for which comparable figures are available is January 1, 1926.

It is interesting to note that out of 19,389,360 telephones operated by private companies throughout the world, 16,935,918 were in the United States, and that the number of telephones per 100 population in this country is markedly more than that in Europe. In the United States there were 14.8 telephones per 100 population, as compared with only 1.5 telephones per 100 population in Europe, where over 88% of the telephones were under government ownership and operation. The only country approaching the United States in the matter of telephone development was Canada, which on January 1, 1926, had 12.2 telephones per 100 of its inhabitants.

A notable feature of American telephone development is the large number of telephones to be found in the smaller towns and rural districts. In communities under 50,000 population in the United States there were 11.7 telephones per 100 inhabitants, which indicates a development for smaller places in America greater than the total telephone development of any country except Canada. In Europe, rural development is almost negligible.

Despite the wide diffusion of telephones in the United States, however, American cities are much more highly developed than comparable foreign cities. New York, for example, had in relation to its population nearly four times as many telephones as London, nearly three times as many as Paris and over twice as many as Berlin. Not only this, but New York City had in actual numbers more telephones than the whole of Great Britain and Northern Ireland. Chicago had more telephones than the whole of France. Los Angeles had more telephones than Italy and Hungary combined, while Omaha, with a population of only 233,000 people, had about one-third as many telephones as the whole of Russia, with its 140,000,000 inhabitants.

Not only has the United States more telephones than all the rest of the world put together, but Americans use the telephone more than the inhabitants of any other country. There were 196 telephone conversations per capita in this country in 1925, as compared with only 32 conversations per capita in Germany, though that country ranked second to the United States as regards the number of telephones in service.


