Torrance P-T A Hears Talk by Vierling Kersey

First Meeting of Year Gathers to Hear L. A. Man Speak

Vierling Kersey, assistant superintendent of Los Angeles city schools, gave a very instructive talk at the first meeting of the Torrance Elementary Parent-Teacher Association Tuesday afternoon.

His subject was "What Shall I Ask Myself at the Beginning of the School Year? Should I Be An Indifferent Parent?"

Mr. Kersey said in part: "What do I know about the schools in my own town? Do I know what my boys and girls do on the playground? Our boys and girls are at the school; they make the spirit of the school. Change teachers, change the principal—but the spirit is there still."

"How do I get my information about the school? Most people don't know much about the school. They obtain their information from the 'They say's.' 'They say' this and 'they say' that. If you get your information from the 'they say's' be sure the 'they say's' are somebody and not a nobody."

"What kind of an education is being given our children? The automobile, the telegraph, the telephone and the radio are different traveling from that 'th' times past. The same improvement is being made in school as in these things. You might as well ride around in a one-horse shay as to expect your children to be taught the same as you were."

"Children are being taught to think, to aspire to the finest things of life, to idealize, but see who and what they idealize. They do not have the same kind of idols that we had. A parent should know about the text books the children use, and the teachers they are under. Ten times as many teachers are rejected in the Los Angeles school system every year as are accepted."

Mr. Kersey spoke very highly of the sextette composed of Mrs. Juliet Young, Mrs. Mabel Ella Sweet, Mrs. Gladys Baker, Mrs. W. J. Haydon, Miss Roberson and Miss Tafe, who sang two numbers.
