Department Plans Big Observance Here for Oct. 9 to 15

Torrance will observe National Fire Prevention Week from Oct. 9 to 15. Mayor Dennis has issued a proclamation urging the public and all organizations to cooperate with the Torrance Volunteer Fire Department, which is arranging a program for the week.

Chief Ben Hannebrink and his men are planning a big demonstration for the public. Details will be published next week. Chief Hannebrink urges the people of Torrance to make the week an occasion for a general cleanup of refuse. The city will cooperate by arranging a schedule when refuse will be carried away from every lot in town. This schedule will also be announced next week.
