Newspaper Space Boosts Sales for Piggly Wiggly Co.

Standard Homes Urged by Hoover Known on Coast

Herbert Hoover, secretary of Commerce, struck a key-note of the building program, prevalent throughout the nation, when he declared:

"A great deal of service to the building industry itself and to the country as a whole, lies in the elimination of those great wastes which are beyond the control of any one individual. Efficiency in industry is more important to the nation than the margin of profit.

"Waste in manufacture and distribution must be eliminated. I do not intend to enter into details, for I need only to mention the question of simplification and standardization of dimensions and of quality, the standardization of buying and selling specifications, the greater uniformity in construction contracts, the simplification of building codes and the better synchronization of different construction industries towards the elimination of intermittent employment."

"Secretary Hoover has taken cognizance of the fact that the building industry lacks synchronization—the very deficiency that we foresee and have overcome.

World's Largest Core Oven Put Up in Nash Factory

The largest continuous type core oven in the world has just been installed in the Nash Motors foundry at Kenosha. The oven, 200 feet long, 17 feet wide, and 10 feet 8 inches high is regarded in the industry as a "marvel of modern efficiency." With this installation the Nash Motors Company has one of the most completely and most efficiently equipped foundries of any automobile plant either in this country or abroad.

The oven is fitted with 150 traveling core racks being suspended from a continuous type overhead conveyor; the racks make a complete circuit of the baking oven. The cores travel two and one-half times the length of the oven, due to the doubling back design of the conveyor system.

Coremakers in the Nash foundry, because of the modern method of baking, are enabled to work at maximum efficiency.

Northern Pacific Uses Buicks for Rail Inspection

FLINT, MICH.—Buick's reputation for reliability has won it an unusual job on the lines of the Northern Pacific Railway company where a specially-adapted Buick Sedan is doing duty as an inspection car. Northern Pacific officials express themselves as "tremendously pleased" with the success of the innovation.

The Buick was equipped for its special duties by the Fence Automobile company of Minneapolis. Planged steel wheels were substituted for the standard wheels, a rigid front axle was provided, and the steering apparatus was removed entirely. Its resemblance to a locomotive was heightened by addition of a cowcatcher.

Advice from the Northern Pacific states that the Buick is making good in every respect. It is in operation constantly, over the entire length of the Northern Pacific line, from St. Paul to Puget Sound, covering 250 to 300 miles a day with ease. The users are particularly pleased with the Buick's flexibility, for which the powerful Buick six-cylinder valve-in-head engine and Buick mechanical four-wheel brakes are mainly responsible.

The cost of the Buick's operation, according to the railway's figures, is less than one-fift that of the equivalent steam equipment, in addition to which it is proving far better adapted to inspect work than the locomotive which it replaced.

Motor Cars Win to Very Heart of Australian Wilds

SYDNEY, AUSTRALIA—After traveling over thousands of miles of the trackless wilds of Central Australia through a region seldom visited by white men, the Reso expedition that started out early this summer has returned to civilization with thrilling accounts of a great country almost as new to the world as the icy wastes of the Antarctic continent or the jungles of the Amazon region.

The Reso expedition was the largest party to ever undertake to penetrate far into the interior of the continent and has been the subject of keen interest for months. It was composed of prominent scientists, doctors, business men, lawyers, newspaper men and sheep ranchers. The trip was made to stimulate interest in the development of the hundreds of thousands of square miles in the interior and was sponsored by the Victorian

Railways. The expedition was unique in that it was the first attempt to explore a wild and unmarked country with automobiles and trucks. The only other notable instances of extensive explorations with motor cars are the trips of Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews of the American Museum of Natural History into the interior of the Mongolian Wilds, on each of which he used Dodge Brothers cars.
