Women's Club Hears Fine Talk on Books and Plea for Indians

Guests of honor at the luncheon of the Women's Club Tuesday were Mrs. William W. Slayden, president of the Los Angeles district, Mrs. Charles McKelvey, district parliamentarian, and Mrs. Hammack, district chairman of literature.

Mrs. Hammack, who was the luncheon speaker, gave a very interesting talk on books. Answering the questions, "How can I find time to read books as I have so little time?" she said that there were many household tasks that could be done just as well with a book propped up in front of one. "A person," she said, "can have adventure in the land of books. A person may have a college diploma, and still not be educated. No one is educated unless he reads. Among the beautiful old books are the King James version of the Bible and Shakespeare. But even with the beautiful old books, we cannot do without modern books. "Hint at Christmas and birthdays for books. Then you can beg or borrow books from your friends. When you read a book, if it is worthwhile, pass it on, but do not pass on a worthless book." In answering the question "What shall I read?" Mrs. Hammack congratulated Torrance on having a librarian as chairman of the literature section. She suggested that the librarian be consulted when in quest of good books.

In speaking of new books for children, Mrs. Hammack said that world friendliness was being featured.

A list of books suggested by Mrs. Hammack included "American" by Van Loon; "Transition" by Will Durant; "Trader Horn" by Oliver Horn; "Mother India" by Mayo; "The Christ of the Indian Road" by E. Stanley Jones; "The Romantic Lady" by Vivian Burnett; "The Call of the House" by Ruth Comfort Mitchell; "Immortal Marriage" by Gertrude Atherton; and "What Can A Man Believe" by Bruce Barton.

Mrs. N. F. Jamieson, chairman of literature, announced that she would conduct a department of literature, and left it to the club members to decide whether it be held in the afternoon or in the evening. This will be decided at the next club meeting.

Chief Standing Bear, brother of Chief Henry Standing Bear, who adopted President Coolidge into the Sioux nation, made a plea that the Indian be given the right of citizenship. While foreigners from nearly every nation on earth have been granted citizenship, the only people who are really natives of America are denied that right.

Chief Standing Bear was attired in the costume of an Indian chief. He also sang a song in his native tongue and then played on a musical instrument, a pipe that was the exact duplicate of those made before there were any tools.

Mrs. Slayden spoke on keeping the visions alive. She said: "We must make an effort to keep alive the spiritual, imagination, rules, the world. Men of ideas and ideals are necessary at all times. Look ahead; vision the future. Get in tune with God. The federation of Women's Clubs is based on a well conceived ideal, service. Federation will grow as the women grow. It will be helpful just as the members make it helpful. We are always working."

Mrs. Charles S. McKelvey, district parliamentarian, spoke to the club on the necessity of incorporating as a non-profit corporation so that they may be in a position to be legal owners of the stock of the club house which they are acquiring. She explained the differences between the duties of a trustee and a director. She held a short club institute.

Miss Helen Brooks, house guest of Mrs. Willis M. Brooks, delighted the club with a group of songs: "Beloved Is My Mother," "Silver Moon" from "My Maryland" and "He Met Her on the Stair." Mrs. J. V. Murray accompanied Miss Brooks in the first two numbers. She was her own accompanist for the last.


