## Veterans Elated at California's Nov. 11 Program

SAN FRANCISCO—Elated over the general participation of the schools throughout the state in the Armistice Day celebration state officials of the American Legion are prepared to submit a report to Governor Young in support of their contention that November 11 each year should remain as a holiday in California.

When Governor Young signed the legislation making Armistice Day a state holiday, he announced that the day was on trial for two years and that if it were not properly observed he would favor legislation to remove the present statute creating the holiday from the books.

"The school children for the first time were brought directly into the Armistice Day program under Governor Young's requirements and every one of the 300 odd Posts of the American Legion justified the confidence placed in them and our pledge to the Governor," State Commander Phil Dodson of South Pasadena declares in reviewing the Armistice Day results.
