of the normal American boy. Legislation to prohibit this on the theory that it would reduce crime, is a mistake, for the criminal would still get his guns from sources outside the United States. As a matter of fact, most of the worst crimes are not committed with a gun. Hatnets, axes, clubs, knives and other instruments take a greater toll.

In their honest desire to bring about law enforcement in this country, it is a question of whether the people will hastily adopt a measure which in the long run would simply make it easier for criminals to carry on their work.

PEW, if any, American enterprises were built with any one man's money. The vision, the inspired and practical dreaming, in each instance may well have been a single individual's, but when it came to giving concrete form to his conception, it was necessary to go to bankers or to the public for his funds. So the first railroad was built, the modern public utility or the latest skyscraper.

Every man who borrows, whether to build a five-room cottage or a 1,000-room hotel, must satisfy the lender on three points: Character, capacity and capital. The borrower may satisfy the lender as to his character and capacity, but as to his capital, he in most instances advances as collateral a piece of real property.

Such property in itself is a risky guaranty of repayment. But here sound stock insurance steps in and guarantees that the value of the collateral offered to secure the loan will continue unimpaired. Not only must the collateral be underwritten by insurance companies, but in like manner, the enterprise itself for which the loan is granted must be safeguarded against the chance of disaster.

Thus does insurance play an indispensable part in all matters involving the extension of credit. It makes possible the loaning of money on a sound, safe basis and becomes the foster-mother of every enterprise.

Insurance, in brief, is the partner of credit. As such it is helping to fulfill the dreams of business genius.
