Federation of Clubs Adopts Two New Aims

Help for Crippled Children and Highway Safety on Program

LOS ANGELES.—Caring for the crippled children and making the highways safe for humanity will be two of the new humanitarian activities of the organized womanhood of the state, according to the action taken today by the executive board of the California Federation of Women's Clubs.

The women "to a man" pledged their aid to the curative clinics to be held by orthopedic surgeons in each county under the auspices of the State Board of Health. Crooked children will be made straight by these specialists, and incurable cases will be helped to become self-supporting through subsidized industries and the sale of their products by the clubwomen, it is planned.

Jay walking and jay driving will not be tolerated by the club women, who unanimously endorsed the work of the California Safety Conference.

Women drivers are more careful and more law abiding than drivers of the opposite sex in the opinion of Mrs. W. W. Green, state president of the federated club women. "I believe the police are to be commended for their activity in enforcing the right of way rule as its violation has caused many a death and serious injury," said Mrs. Green.

Combining cheer and charity the clubwomen pledged that they would use only Christmas Tubercular Seals during the holiday season. To aid in securing an art gallery for the next State Fair at Sacramento a committee consisting of Mrs. Lydia D. Lawhead, Mrs. F. P. Wray and Mrs. J. H. Merrill was appointed by the president.

An exquisite settlement of the reapportionment differences between the rural clubwomen and their city sisters was forecast by the referendum letter being submitted to all clubs by Mrs. Robert J. Burdette of the Los Angeles district, who heads the commission to draft a new plan of representation.
