

James G Rowell Delivers Christian Science Lecture in Torrance Sunday Night

A Christian Science lecture was delivered in the Women's Club-house, Sunday evening, Dec. 18, by James G. Rowell, C. S., member of the board of lecturership of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., on "Christian Science: The Word of God Found Practical."

The lecturer was introduced by Mrs. Grace Bright who said: "Friends: you have been invited here this evening to listen to a Christian Science lecture, which will bring to you a message of love, and peace."

Mr. Rowell spoke in part as follows: "The first religious tenet of Christian Science as stated by its Discoverer and Founder, Mary Baker Eddy, reads: 'As adherents of Truth, we take the inspired word of the Bible as our sufficient guide to eternal life.' (Science and Health, page 497.)"

"A false sense of mind can never see God nor the man of God's creating. Whatever it sees is distorted and colored by its own unreal hue. A universe in which good and evil unite is the way mortal mind sees that of which the Bible says 'And God saw everything that He had made, and behold, it was very good.' (Gen. 1:31). A mortal man, sick, sinful and dying, is the way mortal mind thinks of God's perfect indestructible child, of whom the Bible says 'So God created man in His own image, in the image of God, created he him.' (Gen. 1:27). A God with a finite material body, a God of anger, one who makes mistakes and repents, one who sends flood, fire and pestilence upon His defenseless creation; this is the way mortal mind thinks of the one infinitely good God, the creator, of whom the Bible speaks as Spirit and as Love. Christian Science presents the way out of this seeming conflict between mortal mind and its counterfeited mortal mind. It says of the divine Mind that it is the only mind that is real and true and embraces in itself all that is included in infinite intelligence. On page 186 of Science and Health we read, 'If mortal mind knew how to be better it would be better.' The way out then is no mysterious process at all, but a simple matter of instructing mankind with the truth that there is but one Mind and that one wholly good. Have you ever known of a selfish child's being trained into an unselfish one? What became of its selfishness? It disappeared; it gave place, we say, to unselfishness. There we have it; mortal mind so instructed with truth that it finally disappears and immortal Mind found to be the only Mind. And when mortal mind yields to the divine Mind, a better sense of health is the natural consequence. The ultimate result of this serving divine Mind, God, is salvation, the resign of complete and perfect harmony."

"Jesus of Nazareth earned the glorious title of Christ, not because of his virgin birth only, for the Christ was more than just a gift to Jesus. The Christ Mind came to him in its fullness through consecration to Spirit and through tireless endeavor to gain more understanding of the divine law and to put into practice the spirit of that law. Jesus did not rest upon his spiritual origin as sufficient to prove his Messiahship, but he used it to build upon."

"A dream state illustrates the nature of mortal mind and its control over its creation. The dreamer under the influence of his own dream may smile with pleasure as he rides a beautiful horse down the bridge path, or may cry out with terror as his horse shies and he is thrown to the ground. It makes no difference whether the dream is pleasant or afflictive it is still a dream. All that the dreamer experiences is unreal and untrue. All of his enjoyment and suffering is delusion. The very horse he rides is of his own creating, every movement of the horse is dictated by the dreamer, and every one of his experiences is within the influence of his own thinking, if he but knew it. The dreamer may wish to prolong his pleasant dreams and to cut short his unhappy ones, but what he really needs to do is to cease dreaming."

Reo Travels Long Trail Through States

Hollywood Man Makes Record Trip to Eastern Coast and Return

Making a complete circuit of the United States at a total traveling cost of \$475.80 was the experience of L. P. Simpson and John Kopp, who recently returned to Los Angeles in their 1924 Reo placed on the road by the Larry Wood real estate and investment company in Hollywood. Kopp, his traveling companion, was not with him on the eastbound trip, but left his home in Connecticut to come West when Simpson hit the trail for home.

The Reo touring car only made the entire trip with two punctures and without a nickel's worth of upkeep expense.

The total distance covered for the round trip was 11096 miles, and Simpson made no effort to establish a time record, as he was out for a vacation and to see the country.

His longest day's drive was 422 miles, and the longest distance between service stations was 65 miles. He with that of the 5096 miles covered on the return trip, about 3000 miles would be classified as poor roads, but the Reo pluggled along just as cheerfully over the bad roads as on the boulevards.

Simpson says his Reo has traveled a total of 167,850 miles in its lifetime. On the trip just concluded it traversed California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, North Dakota, Minnesota, Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, Ohio, Pennsylvania, New York, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New Jersey, Maryland, District of Columbia, Delaware, Virginia, North and South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Louisiana, Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.
