Edward Lynch, 60, died at his home in the Hammerton Tract, January 2, after an illness of less than 24 hours. An autopsy disclosed that death was due to enlargement of the heart. Apparently in good health, Mr. Lynch was the life of the party at a family reunion at his home on New Year's birthday.

Born in Tarnia, Ontario, Canada, Mr. Lynch went to Detroit, Michigan, when a lad. For eight years he held the position of druggist in the Hart-Davis laboratories in that city. Following twenty-three years as druggist and miner in Alaska, he lived for seven years in Vancouver, and three years in Seattle.

With Mrs. Lynch, nee Marie, Louise Hill, to whom he was married in 1907, Mr. Lynch came to Torrance in 1921. For five years he has been manager of the Pan-American warehouse on Vermont avenue.

Besides Mrs. Lynch, survivors are a daughter and three grandchildren in Olive, Washington; a brother, Richard Lynch of Tarnia, Canada; and several nieces and nephews, including Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Edwards, who are here from Arizona; Miss Hetty Barney and Thomas Barney of Detroit.

Services were conducted today at 1 o'clock, at Stone and Myers' chapel by Rev. M. E. Cameron of the First Chirothian Church.
