A million and a quarter persons attended the exhibition and new cars worth two million dollars were ordered. The Ford Motor company did not display its wares at the New York show but held a separate exhibition at Madison Square Garden. More than a million persons attended the Ford show.

Baseball fans are mourning the death of the first man to play baseball for money. He was Alfred J. Reach, "Babe Ruth" of the period between 1865 and 1876. When Reach cavorted on the diamond professional baseball players were regarded with considerable disfavor. Saving his salary Reach engaged in the manufacture of sporting goods and accumulated a fortune.
